Provider of Services in the following areas: Community Support, Criminal Justice, Crisis Services, Education, Outpatient, Residential and Substance Use Disorders.

- In FY15 we supported over 16,000 people across the agency.
- Highlights of programs addressing the AHS Population Outcome:
 - o Vermont's families are safe, nurturing, stable and supported.

- Supported initially via non-categorical funding through the personal care transition
- Expanded access to children and families regardless of diagnosis

Challenges:

- ABA or Applied Behavioral Services for Children with Autism
- State is faced with a Medicaid crisis
- Growing population of children and families impacted by opiate crisis
- Designated Agency System has documented sustainability issue

Notes from the field:

- Food Insecurity: Gaps in food programs to include evenings and school vacations
- Housing: A social determinant that impacts mental health for children and families
- Transportation challenges and impact on access to treatment
- Reach-up sanctions and the impact on children

Bright Spots:

- PCIT Parent Child Interaction Therapy- Evidenced based treatment for families with children ages 2-6. Challenge: Sustainable funding See PCIT infographic
- Caring Collaborative- Collective Impact initiative to include UVMMC, United Way, Howard
 Center and a local child care center designed to address children's mental health in the context
 of family and their child care center.
 - Nutrition program (lunch and snack) for all children
 - Pre K expansion grant expanded partnership with CCSU
 - Medical Home learning collaborative with Essex Pediatrics
 - Working Bridges A United Way program geared toward supporting families in finding necessary resources
 - A Steering Committee of over 20 representatives from area organizations and agencies who are committed to bringing their most creative thinking to meet the needs of families
