When it comes to the well-being and prosperity of Vermont's children, families, communities and economy, high-quality, affordable child care is a linchpin.




VERMONT HAS A CHILD CARE CHALLENGE

Lack of access to high-quality, affordable child care forces families to make tough choices.



FAMILIES FACE TOUGH CHOICES



When working parents can't find child care, the businesses that employ them suffer, too.

Research shows that in a six-month period:

► 45% of parents are absent from work at least once due to child care issues, missing an average of 4.3 days.

► 65% of parents' work schedules are affected by child care challenges an average of 7.5 times.

These challenges cost U.S. employers an estimated \$4.4 billion annually.

On average, Vermont child care workers earn \$11.95 an hour. That's less than Vermont's livable wage of \$13.00 an hour.



THE DEMAND: LIKELY TO NEED CARE

Determining the Demand for Child Care in Vermont

Infants: 6 weeks to 23 months

Toddlers: 24 months to 35 months



THE DEMAND: LIKELY TO NEED CARE

Determining the Demand for Child Care in Vermont

- Calculated infant and toddler population based on the Vermont Department of Health's population estimates by age and by county
- Determined the **likely to need care population** based information on the percentage of Vermont children with all available parents in the labor force
 - Statewide, 70.4% of Vermont children under the age of six have all parents in the labor force

THE SUPPLY: REGULATED CHILD CARE

Determining the Supply of Child Care in Vermont

- Used information on the **reported desired capacity** of regulated (licensed and registered) early childhood care and learning programs
 - Reported desired capacity is the number of slots a provider offers (desires) for each age group
 - This is different than a provider's licensed capacity, which is the maximum number of children a provider can care for
- Supply data came from the Vermont Department for Children and Families Child Development Division (CDD)



THE SUPPLY: UNDERSTANDING QUALITY

The Best Available Data: STARS


STARS (**ST**ep **A**head **R**ecognition **S**ystem) is Vermont's quality recognition and improvement system (QRIS) for early care and learning programs.

- Vermont is one of 39 states plus the District of Columbia that uses a QRIS. QRIS are considered a best practice.
- STARS is a voluntary program. Participating programs receive a quality recognition designation of 1 to 5 stars (5 stars being the highest quality recognition level); high-quality defined as 4 and 5 stars.
- Programs that participate in STARS are "stepping ahead," going above and beyond basic state regulations.





Vermont Regulated Early Care and Learning Provider's Reported Desired Capacity By Age Group











Percent of Toddlers LTNC Without Access to Regulated Programs




Percent of Toddlers LTNC Without Access to High-Quality Regulated Programs


Percent of Infants LTNC Without Access to Regulated Programs
