Eliminate barriers to employment with safe, affordable child care and transportation options, including:

- a. Increasing investments in Vermont's Child Care Financial Assistance Program through increases that raise the base rate and expand eligibility;
- b. Creating and funding a study on transportation issues for elders, those with disabilities, and the lowincome population; and
- c. Implementing a driver restoration policy and repealing outdated infractions unrelated to driving or safety that may result in driver's license suspension; implementing "income sensitive" fines; eliminating the license reinstatement fee; and creating a high-risk insurance pool.

- a. Act 172 (H.875) added \$1m to the Governor's recommended funding level to increase the base rate for the Child Care Financial Assistance Program.
- b. No known legislative action was taken.
- c. Act 147 (H.571) implements a variety of driver restoration initiatives including a program allowing persons with outstanding traffic violation judgments entered prior to 7.1.2012 to apply to have judgment reduced to \$30.00 and regain their license if reduced judgments are paid and a payment plan is in place for any other unpaid traffic violation judgments. <sup>1</sup>

Act 158 (H.876) makes several changes to Vermont's current DUI law, including eliminating "hard" suspension periods prior to eligibility for an ignition interlock restricted driver's license and requiring the Commissioner of Motor Vehicles to contract only with a manufacturer who agrees to reduce the cost of installing, leasing, and deinstalling ignition interlock devices by at least 50% for persons receiving 3Squares, LIHEAP, or Reach Up benefits.

#### III. Other Actions

#### OTHER LEGISLATIVE ACTION OF INTEREST:

The Secretary of Commerce and Community Development may annually allocate up to 10 percent of the funding appropriated for the Vermont Training Program to fund work-based learning programs and activities with eligible employers to introduce Vermont students in a middle school, secondary school, career technical education program, or postsecondary school to manufacturers and other regionally significant employers.
