<u>Whereas</u>, promoting the academic success of students who come from families with minimal economic resources and who aspire to be the first member of their family to attend college is the laudable goal of the federal TRIO programs, and, in Vermont, these important academic preparatory programs serve students through the Vermont Student Assistance Corporation and, separately, at seven colleges: Castleton University, Community College of Vermont, Johnson State College, Lyndon State College, Southern Vermont College, the University of Vermont, and Vermont Technical College, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Upward Bound, the original federally financed college incentive program for disadvantaged students, was established in 1964 under the auspices of the federal Office of Economic Opportunity, and it helps secondary school students prepare for college, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Talent Search program, initially authorized in the Higher Education Act of 1965, assists students early in the college admissions and financial aid process, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the federal Education Amendments of 1968 added the Student Support Services program, which was originally known as Special Services for Disadvantaged Students, and, in the late 1960s, the term TRIO was coined to describe these three programs, and

<u>Whereas</u>, over the years, TRIO, through additional federal legislation or U.S. Department of Education administrative action, has been expanded to encompass a total of eight student support programs, including a veterans-specific Upward Bound program, and

<u>Whereas</u>, in a major change in 2001, the Student Support Services program began offering direct grants to certain students who were already the recipients of federal financial support from the Pell Grant program, and

<u>Whereas</u>, students and administrators representing the federal TRIO programs in Vermont are visiting the State House today, Friday, March 17, 2017, now therefore be it

Resolved by the Senate and House of Representatives:

That the General Assembly honors the TRIO academic programs in Vermont and designates March 17, 2017 as TRIO Day at the State House, and be it further
