6	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to make
7	multiple amendments to the requirements of the Rozo McLaughlin Farm-to-
8	School Program (Program), including specifying the purpose and State goal of
9	the Program.
10	An act relating to the Rozo McLaughlin Farm-to-School Program
11	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
12	Sec. 1. 6 V.S.A. chapter 211 is amended to read:
13	CHAPTER 211. THE ROZO MCLAUGHLIN
14	FARM-TO-SCHOOL PROGRAM
15	<u>§ 4719. PURPOSE AND STATE GOAL</u>
16	(a) Purpose. It is the purpose of this chapter to establish a farm-to-school
17	program to:
18	(1) encourage Vermont residents in developing healthy and lifelong
19	habits of eating nutritious local foods;

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1	(2) maximize use by Vermont schools of fresh and locally grown,
2	produced, or processed food;
3	(3) work with partners to establish a food, farm, and nutrition education
4	program that educates Vermont students regarding healthy eating habits
5	through the use of educational materials, classes, and hands-on techniques that
6	inform students of the connections between farming and the foods that
7	students consume;
8	(4) increase the size and stability of direct sales markets available to
9	farmers; and
10	(5) increase participation of Vermont students in school meal programs
11	by increasing the selection of available foods.
12	(b) State Farm-to-School Network goal. It is the goal of the FarmtoSchool
13	Program to establish a food system that by 2025:
14	(1) engages 75 percent of Vermont schools in an integrated food system
15	education program that incorporates community-based learning; and
16	(2) purchases 50 percent of food from local or regional food sources.
17	<u>§ 4720. DEFINITIONS</u>
18	As used in this chapter, "Farm-to-School Program" means an integrated
19	food, farm, and nutrition education program that utilizes community-based
20	learning opportunities to connect schools with nearby farms so that child
21	nutrition programs can provide students with locally produced fresh fruits and

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1	vegetables, dairy and protein products, and other nutritious, locally produced
2	foods; help children develop healthy eating habits; provide nutritional and
3	agricultural education in the classroom, cafeteria, and school community; and
4	improve farmers' incomes and direct access to markets.
5	§ 4721. LOCAL FOODS GRANT PROGRAM
6	(a) There is created in the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets the
7	Rozo McLaughlin Farm-to-School Program to execute, operate, and award
8	local grants for the purpose of helping Vermont schools develop farm-to-
9	school programs that will sustain relationships with local farmers and
10	producers, enrich the educational experience of students, improve the health of
11	Vermont children, and enhance Vermont's agricultural economy.
12	(b) A school, a school district, a consortium of schools, Θ a consortium of
13	school districts, or registered or licensed child care providers may apply to the
14	Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets for a grant award to:
15	(1) fund equipment, resources, training, and materials that will help to
16	increase use of local foods in the School Food Service Nutrition Program;
17	(2) fund items, including local farm food products, gardening supplies,
18	field trips to farms, gleaning on farms, and stipends to visiting farmers, that
19	will help teachers to use hands-on educational techniques to teach children
20	about nutrition and farm-to-school connections; and
21	(3) provide fund professional development and technical assistance, in

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1	partnership with the Agency of Education and farm-to-school technical service
2	providers, to help teachers, school nutrition personnel, and members of the
3	farm-to-school community educate students about nutrition and farm-to-school
4	connections and assist schools in developing a farm-to-school program.
5	(4) fund technical assistance or support strategies to increase
6	participation in federal child nutrition programs that increase viability of
7	sustainable meal programs.
8	(c) The Secretaries of Agriculture, Food and Markets and of Education and
9	the Commissioner of Health, in consultation with farmers, food service
10	workers school nutrition staff, and educators, and farm-to-school technical
11	service providers jointly shall jointly adopt rules procedures relating to the
12	content of the grant application and the criteria for making awards.
13	(d) The Secretary shall determine that there is significant interest in the
14	school community before making an award and shall give priority
15	consideration to schools and, school districts and registered or licensed child
16	care providers that are developing farmtoschool connections and education that
17	indicate a willingness to make changes to their school or child care nutrition
18	programs that increase student access and participation and that are making
19	progress toward the implementation of the Vermont nutrition and fitness policy
20	guidelines School Wellness Policy Guidelines developed by the Agency of
21	Agriculture, Food and Markets, the Agency of Education, and the Department

1	of Health, dated November 2005 updated in June 2015 or of the successor of
2	these guidelines.
3	(e) No award shall be greater than \$15,000.00.
4	§ 4722. FARM ASSISTANCE; SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, FOOD
5	AND MARKETS
6	(a) The Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets shall work with
7	existing programs and organizations to develop and implement educational
8	opportunities for farmers to help them to increase their markets through selling
9	their products to schools, registered or licensed child care providers, and State
10	government agencies and participating in the federal food commodities
11	program, including the federal Department of Defense Fresh Program, and
12	selling to regulated child care programs participating in the Adult and Child
13	Food Program that operate or participate in child nutrition programs.
14	(b) For the purposes of this section and section 4723 of this title, the
15	Secretary may provide funds to one or more technical assistance providers to
16	provide farm-to-school education and teacher training to more school districts
17	and to assist the Secretaries of Agriculture, Food and Markets and of
18	Education to carry out farmer and food service worker training. The Secretary
19	of Agriculture, Food and Markets shall work with distributors that sell
20	products to schools, registered or licensed child care providers, and State
21	government agencies to increase the availability of local products.

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1	§ 4723. PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT FOR FOOD SERVICE
2	PERSONNEL
3	(a) The Secretary of Education, in consultation with the Secretary of
4	Agriculture, Food and Markets, the Commissioner of Health, and farm-to-
5	school organizations and partners, shall offer expanded regional training
6	sessions professional development opportunities for public school food service
7	and child care personnel and child care resource development specialists as
8	funds are made available. Training shall include information about strategies
9	for purchasing procuring, processing, and serving locally grown foods,
10	especially with regard to federal procurement program requirements, as well as
11	information about nutrition, obesity prevention, coping with severe food
12	allergies, universal recycling, and food service operations. The Secretary of
13	Education may use a portion of the funds appropriated for this training session
14	to pay a portion of or all expenses for attendees and to develop manuals or
15	other materials to help in the training.
16	(b) The Secretary of Education shall train people as funds are made
17	available to, with existing programs and organizations, provide training related
18	to procurement of local food and technical assistance to school food service
19	and child care personnel and use a portion of the funds appropriated for this
20	purpose to enable the trained people to provide technical assistance at the
21	school and school district levels.

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1	(c) Training provided under this section shall promote the policies
2	established in the Vermont nutrition and fitness policy guidelines School
3	Wellness Policy Guidelines developed by the Agencies of Agriculture, Food
4	and Markets and of Education and the Department of Health, dated November
5	2005 updated in June 2015, or the guidelines' successor.
6	§ 4724. LOCAL FOODS COORDINATOR FOOD SYSTEMS
7	ADMINISTRATOR
8	(a) The position of local food coordinator Food Systems Administrator is
9	established in the agency of agriculture, food and markets Agency of
10	Agriculture, Food and Markets for the purpose of assisting Vermont producers
11	to increase in increasing their access to commercial markets and institutions,
12	including schools, state registered or licensed child care providers, State and
13	municipal governments, and hospitals.
14	(b) The duties of the local foods coordinator Food Systems Administrator
15	shall include:
16	(1) working with institutions, schools, registered or licensed child care
17	providers, distributors, producers, commercial markets, and others to create
18	matchmaking opportunities that increase the number of Vermont institutions
19	that purchase foods grown or produced in Vermont;
20	(2) coordinating funding and providing support to the farmtoschool and
21	farm-to-institutions programs within the agency of agriculture, food and

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1	markets Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets, and coordinating with
2	interested parties to access funding or create matchmaking opportunities across
3	the supply chain that increase participation in those programs;
4	(3) encouraging and facilitating the enrollment of state employees <u>State</u>
5	employee access and awareness of opportunities for purchasing local food,
6	including: enrollment in a local community supported agriculture (CSA)
7	organization, purchasing from local farm stands, and participation in a
8	farmers' market;
9	(4) developing a database of producers and potential purchasers and
10	enhancing the agency's website Agency's and partners' ability to improve and
11	support local foods coordination through the use of information
12	technology; and
13	(5) providing technical support to local communities with their food
14	security efforts.
15	(c) The local foods coordinator Food Systems Administrator, working with
16	the commissioner of buildings and general services Commissioner of
17	Buildings and General Services pursuant to rules adopted under 29 V.S.A.
18	§ 152(14), shall:
19	(1) encourage and facilitate CSA enrollment awareness of and
20	opportunities to procure healthy local foods by state State employees through
21	the use of approved advertisements and solicitations on state-owned State-

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1	owned property; and
2	(2) implement guidelines for the appropriate use of state State property
3	for employee participation in CSA organizations, including reasonable
4	restrictions on the time, place, and manner of solicitations, advertisements,
5	deliveries, and related activities to ensure the safety and welfare of state State
6	property and its occupants.
7	(d) The local foods coordinator Food Systems Administrator shall
8	administer a local foods grant program, the purpose of which shall be to
9	provide grants to allow Vermont producers to increase their access to
10	commercial and institutional markets.
11	Sec. 2. 16 V.S.A. § 559 is amended to read:
12 13	§ 559. PUBLIC BIDS(a) When the cost exceeds \$15,000.00. A school board or supervisory
14	union board shall publicly advertise or invite three or more bids from persons
15	deemed capable of providing items or services if costs are in excess of
16	\$15,000.00 for any of the following:
17	(1) the construction, purchase, lease, or improvement of any school
18	building;
19	(2) the purchase or lease of any item or items required for supply,
20	equipment, maintenance, repair, or transportation of students; or
21	(3) a contract for transportation, maintenance, or repair services.

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1	(e) Application of this section. Any contract entered into or purchase made
2	in violation of the provisions of this section shall be void; provided, however,
3	that:
4	* * *
5	(4) nothing Nothing in this section shall be construed to prohibit a
6	school board from awarding a school nutrition contract after using any method
7	of bidding or requests for proposals permitted under federal law for award of
8	the contract;. Notwithstanding the monetary amount in subsection (a) of this
9	section for which a school board is required to advertise publicly or invite
10	three or more bids or requests for proposal, a school board is required to
11	publicly advertise or invite three or more bids or requests for proposal for
12	purchases made from the nonprofit school food service account for purchases
13	in excess of \$25,000.00, unless a municipality sets a lower threshold for
14	purchases from the nonprofit school food service account.
