7	community justice centers receive cases, specify how volunteers are screened
8	prior to service on restorative justice panels and reentry programs, and make

11	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

16	(a) Each community justice center:
17	(1) shall have an advisory board or board of directors comprising at least
18	51 percent citizen volunteers;

1	(2) may use a variety of community-based restorative justice
2	approaches, including restorative justice panels, group conferencing, or
3	mediation; and
4	(3) shall include programs to resolve disputes, address the needs of
5	victims, address the wrongdoing of the offender, and promote the rehabilitation
6	of youthful and adult offenders.
7	(b) Meetings of restorative justice panels and meetings to conduct
8	restorative justice group conferencing or mediation shall not be subject to the
9	Vermont Open Meeting Law, 1 V.S.A. chapter 5, subchapter 2.

18	(2) shall, in collaboration with State and local agencies, provide training
19	on the approaches to restorative justice process to citizen volunteers to enable
20	their participation in the local community justice center;

1	(3) may address quality of life quality-of-life issues in the community it
2	serves by providing informational and educational resources to the

4	(4) may apply for funding from private foundations, other governmental
5	sources, or other sources; and

12	(a) Support from the Agency of Human Services. The Agency of Human

14	analysis, and technical support that the community justice centers, in
15	collaboration with the Agency of Human Services, determine are necessary to
16	further their the Agency's policy of restorative justice.
17	(b) Funding from the Agency of Human Services. The Agency of Human
18	Services may provide funding and authorize community justice centers to
19	participate in the implementation of State restorative programs related to
20	juvenile and criminal offenses.

1	(c) Access to information. Community justice center employees and
2	volunteers participating in State-funded programs shall have access to
3	information, analysis, and technical support as necessary to carry out their
4	duties within the program in accordance with State and federal confidentiality
5	statutes and policies. Victim information that is not part of the public record
6	shall not be released without the victim's consent.
7	(d) Liability.
8	(1) For the purposes of defining liability, community justice center
9	volunteers participating in programs funded by the Agency of Human Services
10	pursuant to subsection (b) of this section shall be considered volunteers of that
11	agency the Agency.
12	(2) In all other cases, the State and the, municipality, or any other entity
13	operating a State-funded community justice center shall each be liable for the
14	acts and omissions of employees operating within the scope of their

1	reparative boards justice centers under the supervision of the Commissioner, as
2	provided by this chapter.

6	(a) The Commissioner Each community justice center shall establish
7	reparative boards restorative justice panels and appoint to them members of the
8	community with the advice and recommendation of local nonprofit
9	organizations or municipal entities in the localities concerned. The
10	Commissioner shall appoint each board member to a term of one to three
11	years, may reappoint a member to consecutive terms, and may remove a
12	member for good cause. The local probation and parole office and the
13	volunteer services coordinator together shall screen the volunteer prior to the
14	volunteer's commencing service on a restorative justice panel.
15	(b) Each board shall elect its chair from its membership. A chair may serve
16	for no more than one year uninterrupted. All meetings of a board shall comply
17	with open meeting law requirements of 1 V.S.A. chapter 5, subchapter 2,
18	consistent with probationer confidentiality requirements of this title, and as
19	may be imposed by the court. Each community justice center shall establish a
20	reentry program to address the local needs of the individual probation and
21	parole office. The programs may include navigation services, circles of

1	support and accountability (CoSAs), or other community-based resource and
2	referral services. The community justice center shall appoint to the programs
3	members of the community with the advice and recommendation of local
4	nonprofit organizations or municipal entities. The local probation and parole
5	office and the volunteer services coordinator together shall screen volunteers
6	prior to the volunteer commencing service in the program.
7	(c) Each board shall adopt bylaws approved by the Commissioner. Such
8	bylaws may authorize each board to establish panels to conduct reparative

10	(d) Each board restorative justice panel or reentry CoSA shall conduct its
11	meetings in a manner that promotes safe interactions among an offender,

5	CoSA member shall be considered a volunteer with regard to any grievance or
6	other matter governed by 3 V.S.A. § 1101.
