6	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to establish a
7	pilot program to study the growth, cultivation, and marketing of industrial

12	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
13	Sec. 1. PURPOSE
14	The purpose of this act is to amend the laws of Vermont regarding the
15	cultivation of industrial hemp to conform with federal requirements for
16	industrial hemp research set forth in section 7606 of the federal Agricultural
17	Act of 2014, Public Law No. 113-79, codified at 7 U.S.C. § 5940.

19	CHAPTER 34. HEMP

§ 561. FINDINGS; INTENT

(a) Findings.

- (1) Hemp has been continuously cultivated for millennia, is accepted and available in the global marketplace, and has numerous beneficial, practical, and economic uses, including: high-strength fiber, textiles, clothing, bio-fuel biofuel, paper products, protein-rich food containing essential fatty acids and amino acids, biodegradable plastics, resins, nontoxic medicinal and cosmetic products, construction materials, rope, and value-added crafts.
- (2) The many agricultural and environmental beneficial uses of hemp include: livestock feed and bedding, stream buffering, erosion control, water and soil purification, and weed control.
- (3) The hemp plant, an annual herbaceous plant with a long slender stem ranging in height from four to 15 feet and a stem diameter of one-quarter to three-quarters of an inch is morphologically distinctive and readily identifiable as an agricultural crop grown for the cultivation and harvesting of its fiber and seed.
- (4) Hemp cultivation will enable the State of Vermont to accelerate economic growth and job creation, promote environmental stewardship, and expand export market opportunities.
- (5) The federal Agricultural Act of 2014, Public Law No. 113-79 authorized the growing, cultivation, and marketing of industrial hemp,

1	notwithstanding restrictions under the federal Controlled Substances Act, if
2	certain criteria are satisfied.
3	(b) Purpose. The intent of this chapter is to establish policy and procedures
4	for growing hemp in Vermont that comply with federal law so that farmers and
5	other businesses in the Vermont agricultural industry can take advantage of
6	this market opportunity.
7	§ 562. DEFINITIONS
8	As used in this chapter:
9	(1) [Repealed.]
10	(2) "Hemp products" means all products made from hemp, including
11	cloth, cordage, fiber, food, fuel, paint, paper, construction materials, plastics,
12	seed, seed meal, seed oil, and certified seed for cultivation.
13	(3) "Hemp" or "industrial hemp" means the plant Cannabis sativa L. and
14	any part of the plant, whether growing or not, with a delta-9
15	tetrahydrocannabinol concentration of not more than 0.3 percent on a dry
16	weight basis.
17	(4) "Secretary" means the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets.
18	§ 563. HEMP; AN AGRICULTURAL PRODUCT
19	Hemp Industrial hemp is an agricultural product which that may be grown
20	as a crop, produced, possessed, marketed, and commercially traded in Vermont
21	pursuant to the provisions of this chapter. The cultivation of <u>industrial</u> hemp

1	shall be subject to and comply with the requirements of the required
2	agricultural practices adopted under section 4810 of this title.
3	§ 564. REGISTRATION; ADMINISTRATION; PILOT PROJECT
4	(a) The Secretary shall establish a pilot program to study the growth,
5	cultivation, and marketing of industrial hemp. Under the pilot program, the
6	Secretary shall certify and register persons who will participate in the pilot
7	program through growing or cultivating industrial hemp. A person who
8	intends to participate in the pilot program and grow industrial hemp shall
9	register with the Secretary and submit on a form provided by the Secretary the
10	following:
11	(1) the name and address of the person;
12	(2) a statement that the seeds obtained for planting are of a type and
13	variety that do not exceed the maximum concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol
14	set forth in subdivision 562(3) of this title; and
15	(3) the location and acreage of all parcels sown and other field reference
16	information as may be required by the Secretary.
17	(b) The form provided by the Secretary pursuant to subsection (a) of this
18	section shall include a notice statement that, until current federal law is
19	amended to provide otherwise:
20	(1) cultivation and possession of <u>industrial</u> hemp in Vermont is a
21	violation of the federal Controlled Substances Act unless the industrial hemp is

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1	grown, cultivated, or marketed under a pilot program authorized by section
2	7606 of the federal Agricultural Act of 2014, Public Law No. 113-79; and
3	(2) federal prosecution for growing hemp in violation of federal law
4	may include criminal penalties, forfeiture of property, and loss of access to
5	federal agricultural benefits, including agricultural loans, conservation
6	programs, and insurance programs.
7	(c) A person registered with the Secretary pursuant to this section shall
8	allow industrial hemp crops, throughout sowing, growing season, harvest,
9	storage, and processing, to be inspected and tested by and at the discretion of
10	the Secretary or his or her designee.
11	(d) The Secretary may assess an annual registration fee of \$25.00 for the
12	performance of his or her duties under this chapter.
13	§ 566. RULEMAKING AUTHORITY
14	The Secretary may adopt rules to provide for the implementation of this
15	chapter and the pilot project authorized under this chapter, which may include
16	rules to require hemp to be tested during growth for tetrahydrocannabinol
17	levels and to require inspection and supervision of hemp during sowing,
18	growing season, harvest, storage, and processing. The Secretary shall not
19	adopt under this or any other section a rule that would prohibit a person to

grow hemp based on the legal status of hemp under federal law.

1	Sec. 3. TRANSITION; IMPLEMENTATION
2	All persons registered prior to July 1, 2018 with the Secretary of
3	Agriculture, Food and Markets under 6 V.S.A. chapter 34 to grow or cultivate
4	hemp shall be deemed to be registered with the Secretary of Agriculture, Food
5	and Markets as participants in the industrial hemp pilot project established by
6	this act under 6 V.S.A. § 564, and those previously registered persons shall not
7	be required to reregister with the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets.
8	Sec. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE
9	This act shall take effect on July 1, 2018.
