## Read Third Time; Bill Passed

Sec. 6a. 23 V.S.A. § 1259 is amended to read:

§ 1259. SAFETY BELTS; PERSONS AGE 18 YEARS OF AGE OR

(e) [Repealed.] This section may be enforced only if a law enforcement officer has detained the operator of a motor vehicle for another suspected traffic violation. An operator shall not be subject to the penalty established in this section unless the operator is required to pay a penalty for the primary violation.

Sec. 9. REPORTING OF ROADSIDE STOP DATA RELATED TO ADULT

#### SEATBELT LAW STOPS

On or before January 15, 2019, January 15, 2020, and January 15, 2021, in connection with roadside stops for a suspected violation of 23 V.S.A. § 1259 that occurred in the prior calendar year, the Criminal Justice Training Council shall provide a report to the General Assembly of the stop data required to be collected under 20 V.S.A. § 2366(e)(1), both at the level of the individual stops and as a statistical summary of the stops in the prior calendar year that involved suspected violations of 23 V.S.A. § 1259.

\* \* \* Effective Dates \* \* \*

Sec. 10. EFFECTIVE DATES

(a) This section and Sec. 7 (education campaign) shall take effect on passage.

(b) Sec. 6 (authorizing primary enforcement of adult seatbelt law) shall take effect on October 1, 2018.

(c) Sec. 6a (secondary enforcement of adult seatbelt law) shall take effect on May 1, 2021.

(d) All other sections shall take effect on July 1, 2018.

Thereupon, Rep. Gonzalez of Winooski asked and was granted leave of the House to withdraw her amendment.

Thereupon, the bill was read the third time.

Pending the question, Shall the bill pass? **Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh** demanded the Yeas and Nays, which demand was sustained by the Constitutional number. The Clerk proceeded to call the roll and the question, Shall the bill pass? was decided in the affirmative. Yeas, 133. Nays, 7.

#### **Rep. Colburn of Burlington** explained her vote as follows:

"Madam Speaker:

I support this bill because of convincing evidence that primary seat belt laws save lives and help to reduce racial disparities in roadside fatalities.

That said, I am concerned about creating any new opportunities that may add to racial disparities in traffic stops and ticketing. Collecting data is not enough. Eliminating disparities and bias requires evaluating and using that data to enact meaningful change. We can and must do better."

Rep. Van Wyck of Ferrisburgh explained his vote as follows:

"Madam speaker:

I voted no. Though in general I support primary seat belt enforcement, I don't support making ordinary drivers law-breakers for performing routine, trivial, low-risk, momentary activities with their vehicles, The body should pass common sense legislation and not treat adult drivers as third graders, who lack reasonable judgment."
