State Land Use & Development Act

Act 250 as enacted was a planning law, providing the policy framework for state development regulation.

- Policies 1973 "Plan" (Legislative Intent, Findings)
 What state interests, land use/development goals
- Maps Capability & Development, Land Use
 Where development should happen
- Act 250 Criteria impacts, conformance w/plan
 - How development should happen

Act 250 Outcomes

Act 250, as applied to individual projects, prevents bad development but, absent a state planning or policy framework, doesn't promote good development...

Good ...

- Site layout, design
- Environmental impacts
- Infrastructure impacts
- Hazard mitigation
- Energy efficiency

Not so Good ...

- Siting, location
- Development pattern
- Resource fragmentation
- Aesthetic impacts
- Secondary impacts
- Cumulative impacts

Interest: State Land Use Policy

Evaluate the degree to which Act 250 has been successful in meeting the goals set forth in the Plan...Plan revisions?

- Evaluate state land use, development goals (also relevant to local, regional, state agency planning)
 - Capability and development plan (findings, intent)
 - State planning and development goals (Act 200, Ch. 117)
 - Smart growth principles (Ch. 76A)
- Define and map state interests (land, resources, infrastructure targeted by state for protection, investment, development)

Interest: Emerging Trends

Examine Act 250 criteria in relation to changes that have occurred since 1970...including climate change

- Identify key demographic trends, changing development patterns since 1970.
- Help Identify emerging land use, development issues including, but not limited to climate change, e.g.:
 - Hazard mitigation existing, new, relocated settlement
 - Energy renewable energy development
 - New technology autonomous vehicles (infrastructure, VMT)
 - Community social media, health impact assessments
 - Economy "lifestyle" vs. retail centers; infill, redevelopment
 - Government capacity to plan for, finance, regulate development

Interest: Jurisdiction

Examine interface between Act 250, other permitting... Application to type and scale of development

Evaluate jurisdiction in relation to significance (state, regional or local), magnitude of impact. Options?

- **Release provisions** project vs. parcel-based
- State designations (Ch.76A) additional exemptions
- Expanded "Local Act 250 Review" criteria, presumptions, delegation to qualified municipalities
- Working lands, resource-based designations additional state review as justified (per clear state interests)
- > Is Act 250 the only, or best, tool in the toolbox?

Interest: Act 250 Criteria

Examine Act 250 criteria in relation to development patterns (designated areas, compact centers, rural lands)

Evaluate Act 250 criteria in relation to:

- Development policies state, regional, local interests
- Development patterns established, emerging
- Development impacts land use, infrastructure, fiscal, health, aesthetic impacts (e.g., under 5,6,7,8,9)
- Identify shifts, gaps, redundancies

Concern: Process

Maintain Act 250 as a citizen-based, applicant and citizen-friendly process

Consider:

- Accessibility to municipalities, other parties with no staff
- Return to administrative, quasi-judicial appeals board that hears, consolidates Act 250 and local permit appeals
- Limit more formal "on the record" review e.g., where enacted locally, or as agreed to by all parties
- Options for/limits to negotiated mediation (alternative dispute resolution) between parties
- Limit right to appeal based on level of participation

Concern: Use/Interpretation of Plans

Projects must "conform" to the state capability plan (*Criterion 9*); *municipal and regional plans* (*Criterion 10*)

- Plans vary in content, quality no review for use in Act 250
- No plan, maps referenced under Criterion 9 to evaluate location, pattern, cumulative impacts of development
- Reliance on policy language to exclusion of maps
- Court interpretation of plan language under Criterion 10 increasingly legal, parsed ("should" vs. "shall") – not consistent with intended use, interpretation
- ➢ Key Case: In re B&M Realty, LLC (2016)
- "Conformance with plan" as defined under 24 VSA § 4303?
