RE: Forestry issues in which VWA has an interest

The Vermont Woodlands Association is a 501 (c) (3) whose objectives (briefly) are to encourage good forest management among its members, to educate the public to the importance that trees play in Vermont—from its economy to its environment, and to represent those interests before governmental bodies. VWA has a membership of approximately 800 forest landowners.

I must confess that VWA has not as yet separated its many forestry interests into those to be considered by different committees so will briefly list some of those interests.

Forest Integrity Study Committee's recommendations on Act 250 and municipal land use zoning to protect forest blocks and wildlife connectivity (Act 171)

Workers Comp rates

Eliminating sales tax on logging equipment, repairs and fuel—equality with ag

Right to Practice Forestry—again, equality with ag

Protect funding for Working Lands Board

Combat invasive pests and diseases

Make trucking weights comparable to surrounding states

Explore any possibilities to improve low-grade wood markets

Examine estate tax effects on ag and forest lands

Change Act 64's removal from UVA for failure to provide Activity Report to Act 57's

"After providing 30 days notice to the owner" before removal
