Dear Representative Fagan:

I regret that I cannot be in attendance this evening at the Committees on Appropriations regional meeting in Rutland to give testimony, but I have another commitment which I must attend to in my role as a Rutland City School Commissioner.

I want you and the committee to know that Rutland Mental Health Services is deeply concerned over the proposed reduction of existing developmental disabilities waivers by \$4 million statewide in fiscal year 2019. DAIL Commissioner Hutt has explained the cut will be realized through a two percent reduction in existing developmental disabilities service plans (as outlined in her January 24, 2018 letter to the DD State Standing Committee). For Rutland Mental Health Services, this two percent rescission equates to about a \$325,000 reduction in services to 237 individuals in Rutland County.

Individuals with developmental and intellectual disabilities receive these services for a variety of reasons:

- their personal health and safety is at risk
- public safety is at risk
- it may prevent costly psychiatric hospitalization or institutionalization
- it supports the employment of young adults.

Simply put, RMHS cannot sustain such a reduction in waiver funding without a significant negative impact on services to individuals and families in need in Rutland County.

This proposed cut seems inconsistent with a recent good faith agreement with the Agency of Human Services and DAIL whereby the Designated and Specialized Service Agencies are working together to address the need for accountability without destabilizing the developmental disabilities system of care. The goal of this effort is to fully meet the needs of those served and to ensure consistency between assessed need and funded services, all while achieving consistent quality outcomes, accountability of resources, and continued high consumer satisfaction. A reduction in funding seems counter to this effort.

At the basis of all the work that we do is a fundamental commitment to help people be healthy and connected to their communities, regardless of their disability. Reductions in supports for developmental disabilities further stresses a system that depends on healthy and vital relationships between people receiving and giving supports. Keeping people with developmental and intellectual disabilities active and engaged also improves the health and well-being of our community.

While on the topic of appropriations, I would be remiss if I did not emphasize the importance of Stage 2 of the workforce investment in the Designated Agency system as articulated in S.133 and Act 82. Rutland Mental Health Services encourages the appropriation of \$5.74 million in general funds to conceptually achieve a \$15 minimum wage for staff, but with flexibility to target compensation increases to the most critical positions to meet community needs, address local labor market dynamics, and cover employee benefit costs and technology infrastructure.
