# Why Working Families Have Trouble Making Ends Meet:

# The Monthly Budget of a Food-Insecure Vermont Family

Based on a four-member family living in a rural area of the state: Two adult wage earners, and two children ages 4 and 6.

#### Income:

Two full-time wage earners: \$10.00 @ 40 hours/week x 4.3 weeks/month x 2: \$3,440 *Note:* total yearly income is \$41,280 (168% of the poverty level)

## **Expenses\*:**

Basic necessities for a family of four, including:
