

## **Overview of Spending By Category**


FY 2017 Actual Special Education Spending By Expenditure Category

## **Maintenance of Fiscal Support (MFS)**

- An SEA is required to make available the same amount of state financial support from one year to the next for the education of children with disabilities.
  - Required to ensure that sufficient funds are set aside to allow predictability for LEAs to plan their special education programs.
- If not met, the IDEA grant can be lowered by the amount by which the state failed to meet the requirement.



#### **Maintenance of Effort**

LEA Maintenance of Effort (MOE) – spending at least a certain level of non-federal funds for Special Education

- LEAs must budget and spend at least the same amount of local
   or state and local funds for the education of children with disabilities
- LEAs can justify reductions due to:
  - a) voluntary or for-cause departure of special education staff,
  - b) decrease in enrollment of IDEA eligible children,
  - c) termination of an exceptionally costly program for a particular child, under certain circumstances,
  - d) termination of costly expenditures for long-term purchases, and e) assumption of cost by its SEA's high-cost fund



#### **Concerns with the Current Bill Draft**

**Sec. 1 -** Outlines a plan to implement a change over several years

- The AOE recognizes that it will take some SUs more time to implement this change
- However, the AOE cannot run more than one system simultaneously
- The administrative benefits of a block grant will not be realized, and the AOE made need more resources
- Treating SUs differently isn't fair or equitable



## **Concerns with the Current Bill Draft**

#### Sec. 2 – Consulting Services

- The Agency recognizes the benefits of working with a third party to help SU/SDs implement these changes
- However, this change does not create long term capacity at the Agency to provide technical assistance to SU/SDs
- The Agency prefers that investment be made in the Agency



## **Concerns with the Current Bill Draft**

#### Sec. 3 –Block Grant

- (d)(1) reductions as outlined in the bill will not meet the maintenance of effort requirement
- The AOE model on the following slide is a proposed method for calculating the block grant
- This does not include a poverty adjustment, the Agency recognizes the connection between Special Education needs and Poverty and believes the legislature should continue to consider it a factor in the Block Grant.

## **Extraordinary Reimbursement**

#### Sec. 3 –Extraordinary Reimbursement

- (a) shifts extraordinary reimbursement to a multiplier of ADM
  - Two tier system
- AOE believes that the threshold should changeit is no longer the appropriate level
- The following charts provide additional details on extraordinary cost reimbursement
- Additional analysis is needed on the proposal in (c)(1)



## **Exceptional Circumstances**

- § 2963a. This section is currently repealed
- AOE is investigating the use of this provision especially now that Special Education costs are at the SU level.
- The legislature may want to consider a relief value for some type of exceptional circumstance at the discretion of the Secretary of the AOE



## **Payments**

- § 2969 This section outlines when the payments should be made.
- AOE spoke to the Treasurer's office and more frequent payments would be best for the state's cash flow.
  - Currently 2 payments of estimated \$80M each
- AOE proposes that there be three payments made to districts so that the state's cash is not impacted.
  - The payments currently are made 3 times per year.



## **Proposed Strike All Language**

- VSBA, VSA, VCSEA, VPA proposed strike all language to establish a working group to determine an implementation plan
- AOE does not object to this proposal; implementation of best practices is critical to the successful transition to a new funding model
- However, a delay in the funding formula will not generate cost containment and will delay the administrative benefits of changing the funding formula.
