Update on Federal Funding for 21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st CCLC)

- Budget FY2017: Passed by Congress with \$1.192 billion for 21st CCLC
- Budget FY2018:
 - President Trump proposed complete elimination of the 21st CCLC program
 - Senate passed funding at \$1.192 billion
 - House passed funding at \$1.1 billion
 - Funding for FY2018 is still uncertain as the country is operating under a continuing resolution that expires on January 19, 2018
 - Expected final spending levels for FY2018 are expected to fall within that range (between \$1.192 and \$1.1 billion)
- Budget FY2019: President Trump is expected to once again propose complete elimination of the 21st CCLC program including all funding for afterschool and summer learning programs in the federal budget

In Vermont

- Vermont currently received approximately \$5.7 million per year in 21st CCLC funding. Funds are awarded to local communities, schools, districts, and supervisory unions through a competitive grant process with 5-year grant awards.
- Even under current funding levels, the 21st CCLC program in Vermont is not able to meet all demand in the state.
- In the 2018 grant competition, requests for funding are expected to total more than \$4.1 million while available funds to be awarded this year will be no more than \$2.0 to \$2.3 million.
- Letters of intent for this year's competition show 19 applications expected, 13 of which come from communities that have 21st CCLC grants now and are hoping to continue to offer programs to the children and youth in their schools.
- The 19 applications represent funding to a total of 64 different schools, all meeting the eligibility requirements for high levels of students qualifying as low-income.
- Almost 60% of the applications include the addition of new sites, with 44 of the applying sites coming in as existing 21st CCLC recipients and 20 coming in as new sites. A significant portion of the growth in new sites is thought to be due to district consolidation under Act 46.
- According to VT Agency of Education, approximately 100 schools in Vermont currently receive 21st CCLC funding. Another 70-80 schools meet the eligibility requirements for 21st CCLC but either have not applied for funding or have not been successful in a 21st CCLC grant competition in the past.
