Dear Government Operations Committee,

Regarding the proposed legislation that removes the practice guidelines requirement and the Transition To Practice requirement for new graduate nurse practitioners (NP), I feel this is safe practice for your citizens. I have been a nurse practitioner in New Hampshire, a full practice authority state for many years. In my experience, new graduates seek out the support mentoring and collaboration that they need as a natural aspect of professional practice as an NP. Collaborative relationships are a hallmark of good practice. There is no evidence that Transition To Practice requirements are necessary.

I have owned a practice in New Hampshire for 15 years. Before I did that, I CHOSE to work in offices that employed physicians, physician assistants and nurse practitioners. I knew that I was not ready to do more than that. After a period of time that was right for me, I opened my private practice.

I also serve on the New Hampshire Board of Nursing. I have been on the Board for the past nine years. Although in that time we have had numerous adjudicative sessions and NONE of them have been concerning the practice of a new graduate NP. Currently there are approximately 1700 NPs in New Hampshire. Nurse Practitioners represent very few of the complaints received by the Board of Nursing in general and I have not seen a complaint about a new grad needing mentoring.

As a nurse practitioner in a full practice authority state, I feel there is no need to mandate a transition to practice. The evidence shows that Nurse Practitioners want to CARE for their patients and will seek out what they need in order to do that.
