### **Children in Poverty and Access to Head Start**

In Vermont, of the **1,961** children between the ages of three and five in poverty, **51.7%** had access to HS. Of the **2,858** children under three in poverty, only **15.2%** had access to EHS.

Head Start employees in Vermont The average Head Start teacher with a Bachelor's degree makes \$28,730, compared to the \$54,920 a kindergarten teacher with a Bachelor's degree makes. In 2016, 14 Head Start teachers left their classrooms in search of a higher salary.

Local programs work hard to ensure that children facing particularly difficult circumstances, such as experiencing homeless or having a parent who may deploy, have access to the Head Start advantage.

### Head Start's Impact: the Head Start Advantage

Children that participate in Head Start programs receive innumerable benefits. These advantages appear immediately, last a lifetime, and even have an effect on other generations.

### **38%**

Head Start children reduce their vocabulary deficit by 38% during the program year.

## **19%**

Head Start children are 19% less likely to smoke as adults.

### 6 percentage points

Head Start children are 6 percentage points more likely to graduate high school than their non-Head Start siblings.

### <mark>31</mark>%

Head Start alumni are 31% less likely to have been held back a grade.
