3	Subject: Human services; nursing homes; transfer of ownership; Department
4	of Disabilities, Aging, and Independent Living
5	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to establish a
6	working group to examine the oversight of nursing homes in Vermont. It
7	would also eliminate a requirement for a certificate of need prior to the transfer
8	of ownership of a nursing home.
9	An act relating to nursing home oversight
10	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
11	Sec. 1. NURSING HOME OVERSIGHT WORKING GROUP; REPORT
12	(a) Creation. There is created the Nursing Home Oversight Working Group
13	to examine the oversight of nursing homes in Vermont, including financial
14	stability and licensing criteria, in order to ensure the provision of high-quality
15	services and a safe and stable environment for nursing home residents.
16	(b) Membership. The Working Group shall be composed of the following
17	nine eight members:
18	(1) the Commissioner of Disabilities, Aging, and Independent Living or
19	designee, who shall be the Chair;

1	(2) the Director of the Division of Licensing and Protection in the
2	Department of Disabilities, Aging, and Independent Living or designee;
3	(3) the Director of the Division of Rate Setting in the Agency of Human
4	Services or designee;
5	(4) the Vermont Attorney General or designee;
6	(5) the State Long-Term Care Ombudsman or designee;
7	(6) the Executive Director a representative of the Vermont Health
8	Care Association or designee;
9	(7) a member of the Department of Disabilities, Aging, and Independent
10	Living Advisory Board appointed by the Commissioner selected by the
11	Board; and
12	(8) a nursing home owner or administrator appointed by the
13	Commissioner; and
14	(9) a nursing home resident appointed by the State Long-Term Care
15	Ombudsman.
16	(c) Powers and duties. The Working Group shall:
17	(1) identify procedures to monitor nursing homes' ongoing financial
18	stability and to provide for early identification of nursing homes in financial
19	distress, including:
20	(A) reviewing the types and frequency of the financial data
21	currently reported by nursing homes, including data reported pursuant to

1	statutes, rules, and procedures, as well as to whom the data are reported
2	and how the recipient uses the information; and
3	(B) developing a process for addressing circumstances in which
4	nursing homes are determined to be in financial distress;
5	(2) determine whether and what types of additional financial data may
6	be necessary to evaluate nursing homes' ongoing financial stability, including
7	cost data related to real estate lease agreements with related or other parties
8	resulting from the separation of the entity owning the real estate from the entity
9	operating the facility;
10	(3) review the types and frequency of the financial data currently
11	reported by nursing homes to the Division of Rate Setting;
12	(4) evaluate the processes by which the Division of Rate Setting
13	currently reviews nursing home financial data;
14	(5) develop methods to address circumstances in which nursing
15	homes are determined to be in financial distress;
16	(3) review, in consultation with the Green Mountain Care Board,
17	the criteria that the Board considers in its review of applications for
18	transfers of nursing home ownership and determine how those criteria
19	should be addressed in the future, by whom, and as part of what process;

1	(4) determine the appropriate regulatory entity or entities and the
2	resources needed to monitor the ongoing quality of care and financial
3	stability of nursing homes on an ongoing basis;
4	(7) identify any changes to current rules that are needed to support
5	nursing homes' ongoing financial stability to ensure the provision of high-
6	quality services and a safe and stable environment for nursing home
7	residents, and estimate the amount of associated increased costs to the
8	Medicaid program, if any; and
9	(5) review current nursing home application and licensure requirements
10	and identify any necessary changes, including any changes that are needed to
11	ensure that:
12	(A) for the transfer of ownership of a nursing home, the purchaser
13	has obtained the necessary financing for the transaction prior to the issuance of
14	a license;
15	(B) appropriate and objective criminal background, abuse registry,
16	regulatory, and quality information is considered prior to issuance of initial and
17	renewal licenses; and
18	(C) appropriate information is disclosed through the application
19	process to enable the identification of the ownership, controlling, and
20	management interests in both the real estate and operations components of the
21	nursing home.

1	(d) Assistance. The Working Group shall have the administrative,
2	technical, and legal assistance of the Department of Disabilities, Aging, and
3	Independent Living.
4	(e) Report. On or before January 15, 2019, the Working Group shall
5	submit a written report to House Committee on Human Services and the Senate
6	Committee on Health and Welfare that includes its findings and any
7	recommendations for legislative action.
8	Sec. 2. 18 V.S.A. § 9434 is amended to read:
9	§ 9434. CERTIFICATE OF NEED; GENERAL RULES
10	(a) A health care facility other than a hospital shall not develop or have
11	developed on its behalf a new health care project without issuance of a
12	certificate of need by the Board. For purposes of this subsection, a "new
13	health care project" includes the following:
14	* * *
15	(3) The offering of any home health service, or the transfer or
16	conveyance of more than a 50 percent ownership interest in a health care
17	facility other than a hospital or nursing home.

19	Sec. 3. EFFECTIVE DATES
20	(a) Sec. 1 (Nursing Home Oversight Working Group) and this section shall
21	take effect on passage.

- 1 (b) Sec. 2 (18 V.S.A. § 9434) shall take effect on July 1, 2018 and shall
- 2 <u>apply to all transfers of ownership initiated on or after that date.</u>
