Putney	WSWMD has 19 member towns, and until this past June operated a MRF. The District decided to close the MRF due to high operating costs, and the trend to single stream recycling. Organics recycling is probably the future of WSWMD.

Stratton	WSWMD needs such additional funding to support an expansion of our food
Townshend	waste composting operation in Brattleboro.
Vernon	WSWMD's food scrap composting facility in Brattleboro is now processing the 2nd largest volume of food waste in the state, at approximately 1,000 tons per year. Our facility is reaching capacity and without an investment of approximately \$800,000 to \$1 million in the next two years, will not be able to process projected quantities of food waste as more food scrap generators are subject to Act 148.

Our estimated need for funds is consistent with the 2013 Systems Analysis Report by DSM, which estimated that the capital costs for a regional food scrap composting facility would be approximately \$1 million for a medium sized facility to process 5,000 tons per year, and \$2 million to process 10,000 tons per year.

Therefore, WSWMD would benefit from a source of funding to further develop our organics processing facility.
