**Summary of select provisions:** Among other provisions, Act 38:

- <u>State Highway Bridge Program; Project Added</u>. Added a project to the development and evaluation list of the State Highway Bridge Program for the rehabilitation of the Quechee Gorge Bridge.
- <u>DMV Spending Authority; Class 2 Town Highway Program Spending Authority;</u> <u>Municipal Mitigation Assistance Program Spending Authority; License Plate Savings.</u>
  - ➤ DMV spending authority: Sec. 2 reduced FY18 spending authority for DMV by \$200,000. When the bill passed the Senate, this reduction was based on the assumption that \$200,000 in savings would be realized by eliminating front license plates from most vehicles. However, following a committee of conference on the miscellaneous motor vehicle bill, front license plates were not eliminated. Nonetheless, the \$200,000 reduction in spending authority remained in the T Bill that came out of the conference committee.
  - ➤ MMAP spending authority: Sec. 8 increased spending authority for the Municipal Mitigation Assistance Program by \$1,000,000 overall. The \$1,000,000 overall increase is the net of:
    - (i) a \$1,400,000 <u>increase</u> in spending authority of capital bond proceeds appropriated to the Program in the Capital Bill; and
      - (ii) a \$400,000 decrease in spending authority of transportation funds.
  - Class 2 Town Highway Program: Sec. 5 increased spending authority for the Class 2 Town Highway Program by \$600,000 in transportation funds. The \$600,000 overall increase results from adding:
    - (i) the \$200,000 made available by the \$200,000 reduction in DMV spending authority of transportation funds in Sec. 2; and
    - (ii) the \$400,000 made available by the \$400,000 reduction in spending authority of transportation funds in Sec. 8 (MMAP).
  - License Plate Savings: Sec. 4a directed the Commissioner of DMV to provide the House and Senate Committees on Appropriations and on Transportation an updated analysis of single plate-related cost savings by 12/1/17. This report

<u>Automated Vehicles</u>. Directed the Secretary of Transportation to convene a meeting of public and private stakeholders with expertise related to automated vehicles in order to gather information related to automated vehicles and identify policy areas requiring further research or possible legislation and report back to the House and Senate Committees on Transportation *by January 15, 2018* on its activities and any recommendations related to automated vehicles.

## • <u>Highways</u>; <u>Utility Facilities</u>.

- Requires the Agency (in the case of State highways) and municipalities (in the case of town highways) to seek input and consider input received from utilities prior to issuing a utility relocation or adjustment order in connection with highway work, and to allocate to each affected utility a reasonable time to carry out its relocation or adjustment work.
- Further provides that if a utility fails to move or adjust its line or other facility within the time specified in the relocation or adjustment order, and the failure was within the utility's control, the utility will be liable to the State or to the municipality for damages that the State or municipality is required to pay a contractor for a delay caused by the failure.

# II. Miscellaneous Motor Vehicle Bill, Act 71 (S.127)

Summary of select provisions: Among other provisions, Act 71:

- <u>Prohibition on Handheld Use of a Portable Electronic Device While Driving</u>. Amended provisions related to points assessed against a person's driving record if convicted of violating the law prohibiting handheld use of a portable electronic device while driving.
- <u>DUI</u>; <u>Total Abstinence Program</u>; <u>Ignition Interlock Devices</u>. Removed the use of regulated prescription drugs as a disqualification for restoration of a person's driving privilege under the Total Abstinence Program, as long as the person used the prescription drug in a manner consistent with the prescription label; prescribed minimum average periods between random retests of persons operating a motor vehicle under an ignition interlock restricted driver's license; and eliminated a provision related to ignition interlock devices equipped with a GPS feature.
- Motor Vehicle Purchase and Use Tax. Provided that the three-month limitation on the period in which to reduce the taxable cost of a motor vehicle by the sale of a previously

owned vehicle shall not apply to vehicles sold to the manufacturer pursuant to a buyback agreement under a Volkswagen, Audi, or Porsche diesel engine defeat device settlement or judgment, if the vehicle is sold to the manufacturer within specified time periods.

- <u>Vermont Strong License Plates</u>. Removed any end date from the law that authorizes certain motor vehicles registered in Vermont to display Vermont Strong plates that cover a regular front license plate.
- <u>License Plate Savings</u>. Directed the Commissioner of DMV to identify opportunities to save money on the production and acquisition of license plates and to estimate savings that would result from eliminating the requirement to display front license plates for most vehicles registered in Vermont. *Report is due on January 15, 2018*.
- <u>Incident Clearance</u>: Enacted and amended a variety of provisions related to removal of vehicles and cargo from highways following an incident.
