2	The Committee on Natural Resources, Fish and Wildlife to which was
3	referred Senate Bill No. 103 entitled "An act relating to the regulation of toxic
4	substances and hazardous materials" respectfully reports that it has considered
5	the same and recommends that the House propose to the Senate that the bill be
6	amended by striking out all after the enacting clause and inserting in lieu
7	thereof the following:
8	* * * Toxics Use Reduction and Reporting * * *
9	Sec. 1. 10 V.S.A. § 6633 is added to read:
10	§ 6633. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMITTEE ON CHEMICAL
11	MANAGEMENT
12	(a) Creation. There is created the Intergovernmental Committee on
13	Chemical Management in the State to:
14	(1) evaluate chemical inventories in the State on an annual basis;
15	(2) identify potential risks to human health and the environment from
16	chemical inventories in the State; and
17	(3) propose measures or mechanisms to address the identified risks from
18	chemical inventories in the State.
19	(b) Membership. The Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical
20	Management shall be composed of the following nine members:

.1	(1) one member of the House of Representatives, appointed by the
2	Speaker of the House;
3	(2) one member of the Senate, appointed by the Committee on
4	Committees:
5	(3) the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets or designee;
6	(4) the Secretary of Natural Resources or designee;
7	(5) the Commissioner of Health or designee;
8	(6) the Commissioner of Labor or designee;
9	(7) the Commissioner of Public Safety or designee;
10	(8) the Secretary of Commerce and Community Development or
11	designee;
12	(9) the Commissioner of Information and Innovation, or the
13	Commissioner of the successor department, or designee.
14	(c) Powers and duties. The Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical
15	Management shall:
16	(1) Convene a citizen advisory panel to provide input and expertise to
17	the Committee. The citizen advisory panel shall consist of persons with
18	expertise in;
19	(A) toxicology;
20	(B) environmental law;
21	(C) manufacturing products;

1	(D) environmental health;
2	(E) public health;
3	(F) risk analysis;
4	(G) maternal and child health care;
5	(H) occupational health;
6	(I) industrial hygiene;
7	(J) public policy;
8	(K) chemical management by academic institutions;
9	(L) retail sales; and
10	(M) development and administration of information reporting
11	technology or databases.
12	(2) Monitor actions taken by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency
13	(EPA) to regulate chemicals under the Toxic Substances Control Act,
14	15 U.S.C. chapter 53, and notify relevant State agencies of any EPA action
15	relevant to the jurisdiction of the agency.
16	(3) Annually review chemical inventories in the State in relation to
17	emerging scientific evidence in order to identify chemicals of high concern not
18	regulated by the State.
19	(d) Assistance. The Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical
20	Management shall have the administrative, technical, and legal assistance of
21	the Agency of Natural Resources; the Agency of Agriculture, Food and

.1	Markets; the Department of Health; the Department of Public Safety; the
2	Department of Labor; the Agency of Commerce and Community
3	Development; and the Department of Information and Innovation. The
4	Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical Management shall have the
5	assistance of the Office of Legislative Council for legislative drafting and the
6	assistance of the Joint Fiscal Office for the fiscal and economic analyses.
7	(e) Report. On or before January 15, and annually thereafter, the
8	Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical Management shall report to the
9	Senate Committees on Natural Resources and Energy; on Health and Welfare;
10	and on Economic Development, Housing and General Affairs and the House
11	Committees on Natural Resources, Fish and Wildlife; on Human Services; and
12	on Commerce and Economic Development regarding the actions of the
13	Committee. The provisions of 2 V.S.A. § 20(d) regarding expiration of
14	required reports shall not apply to the report to be made under this section.
15	The report shall include:
16	(1) an estimate or summary of the known chemical inventories in the
17	State, as determined by metrics or measures established by the Committee;
18	(2) a summary of any change under federal statute or rule affecting the
19	regulation of chemicals in the State;
20	(3) recommended legislative or regulatory action to address the risks
21	posed by new or emerging chemicals of high concern; and

1	(4) recommended legislative or regulatory action to reduce health risks
2	from exposure to chemicals of high concern and reduce risks of harm to the
3	natural environment.
4	(f) Meetings.
5	(1) The Secretary of Natural Resources shall be the chair of the
6	Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical Management.
7	(2) The Secretary of Natural Resources shall call the first meeting of the
8	Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical Management to occur on or before
9	July 1, 2017.
10	(3) A majority of the membership of the Intergovernmental Committee
11	on Chemical Management shall constitute a quorum.
12	(g) Authority of agencies. The establishment of the Intergovernmental
13	Committee on Chemical Management shall not limit the independent authority
14	of a State agency to regulate chemical use or management under existing State
15	or applicable federal law.
16	Sec. 2. INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMITTEE ON CHEMICAL
17	MANAGEMENT; REPORT ON TOXIC USE REDUCTION AND
18	REPORTING
19	On or before February 15, 2018, after consultation with the citizen advisory
20	panel and as part of the first report required under 10 V.S.A. § 6633(e), the
21	Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical Management shall:

1	(1) Recommend how the State shall establish a centralized or unified
2	electronic reporting system to facilitate compliance by businesses and other
3	entities with chemical reporting and other regulatory requirements in the State.
4	The recommendation shall:
5	(A) identify a State agency or department to establish and administer
6	the reporting system;
7	(B) estimate the staff and funding necessary to administer the
8	reporting system;
9	(C) propose how businesses and the public can access information
10	submitted to or maintained as part of the reporting systems, including whether
11	access to certain information or categories of information should be limited due
12	to statutory requirements, regulatory requirements, trade secret protection, or
13	other considerations;
14	(D) propose how information maintained as part of the reporting
15	system can be accessed, including whether the information should be
16	searchable by: chemical name, common name, brand name, product model,
17	Global Product Classification (GPC) product brick description, standard
18	industrial classification, chemical facility, geographic area, zip code, or
19	address;
20	(E) propose how manufacturers of consumer products or subsets of
21	consumer products shall report or notify the State of the presence of designated

1	chemicals of concern in a consumer product and how information reported by
2	manufacturers is made available to the public;
3	(F) propose a method for displaying information or filtering or
4	refining search results so that information maintained on the reporting system
5	can be accessed or identified in a serviceable or functional manner for all users
6	of the system, including governmental agencies or departments, commercial
7	and industrial businesses reporting to the system, nonprofit associations, and
8	citizens; and
9	(G) estimate a timeline for establishment of the reporting system.
10	(2) Recommend statutory amendments and regulatory revisions to
11	existing State recordkeeping and reporting requirements for chemicals,
12	hazardous materials, and hazardous wastes in order to facilitate assessment of
13	risks to human health and the environment posed by the use of chemicals in the
14	State. The recommendations shall include:
15	(A) the thresholds or amounts of chemicals used, manufactured, or
16	distributed, and hazardous materials and hazardous wastes generated or
17	managed in the State that require recordkeeping and reporting;
18	(B) the persons or entities using, manufacturing, or distributing
19	chemicals and generating or managing hazardous materials and hazardous
20	wastes that are subject to recordkeeping and reporting requirements; and

1	(C) any changes required to streamline and modernize existing
2	recordkeeping and reporting requirements to facilitate compliance by
3	businesses and other entities.
4	(3) Recommend amendments to the requirements for Toxic Use
5	Reduction and Hazardous Waste Reduction under 10 V.S.A. chapter 159,
6	subchapter 2 that shall include:
7.	(A) The list of chemicals or materials subject to the reporting and
8	planning requirements. The list of chemicals or materials shall include and be
9	in addition to the chemicals or substances listed under Title III, Section 313 of
10	the Superfund Amendments and Reauthorization Act of 1986 and 18 V.S.A.
11	§ 1773 (chemicals of high concern to children).
12	(B) The thresholds or amounts of chemicals used or hazardous waste
13	generated by a person that require reporting and planning.
14	(C) The information to be reported, including:
15	(i) the quantity of hazardous waste generated and the quantity of
16	hazardous waste managed during a year;
17	(ii) the quantity of toxic substances, or raw material resulting in
18	hazardous waste, used during a year;
19	(iii) an assessment of the effect of each hazardous waste reduction
20	measure and toxics use reduction measure implemented; and

1	(iv) a description of factors during a year that have affected toxics
2	use, hazardous waste generation, releases into the environment, and on-site and
3	off-site hazardous waste management.
4	(D) The persons or entities using chemicals or generating hazardous
5	waste that are subject to reporting and planning;
6	(E) Proposed revisions to the toxic chemical or hazardous waste
7	reduction planning requirements, including conditions or criteria that qualify a
8	person to complete a plan.
9	(F) Any changes to streamline and modernize the program to improve
10	its effectiveness.
11	(4) Draft legislation to implement the Committee's recommendations
12	under subdivisions (1), (2), and (3) of this section.
13	* * * Testing Groundwater * * *
14	Sec. 3. 10 V.S.A. § 1982 is added to read:
15	§ 1982. TESTING OF GROUNDWATER SOURCES
16	(a) Definition. As used in this section, "groundwater source" means that
17	portion of a potable water supply that draws water from the ground, including
18	a drilled well, shallow well, driven well point, or spring.
19	(b) Testing prior to new use. Prior to use of a new groundwater source as a
20	potable water supply, the person who owns or controls the groundwater source

1	shall test the groundwater source for the parameters set forth in subsection (c)
2	of this section.
3	(c) Parameters of testing. A water sample collected under this section shall
4	be analyzed for, at a minimum: arsenic, lead, uranium, gross alpha radiation,
5	total coliform bacteria, total nitrate and nitrite, fluoride, manganese, and any
6	other parameters required by the Agency by rule. The Agency by rule may
7	require testing for a parameter by region or specific geographic area of
8	concern.
9	(d) Submission of test results. Results of the testing required under
10	subsection (b) shall be submitted, on a form provided by the Department of
11	Health, to the Department of Health and, when required by the Secretary
12	pursuant to a permit, to the Secretary.
13	(e) Rulemaking. The Secretary, after consultation with the Department of
14	Health, the Wastewater and Potable Water Supply Technical Advisory
15	Committee, private laboratories, and other interested parties, shall adopt by
16	rule requirements regarding:
17	(1) when, prior to use of a new groundwater source, the test required
18	under subsection (b) of this section shall be conducted;
19	(2) who shall be authorized to sample the source for the test required
20	under subsections (b) and (c) of this section, provided that the rule shall

1	include the person who owns or controls the groundwater source and licensed
2	well drillers among those authorized to sample the source;
3	(3) how a water sample shall be collected in order to comply with the
4	requirements of the analyses to be performed; and
5	(4) any other requirements necessary to implement this section.
6	(f) Marketability of title. Noncompliance with the requirements of this
7	section shall not affect the marketability of title or create a defect in title of a
8	property, provided water test results required under this section are forwarded,
9	prior to the conveyance of the property, to the Department of Health and, when
10	required by the Secretary pursuant to a permit, to the Agency.
11	Sec. 4. AGENCY OF NATURAL RESOURCES; GROUNDWATER
12	SOURCE TESTING; RULEMAKING
13	The Secretary of Natural Resources shall commence rulemaking under
14	10 V.S.A. § 1982 on or before July 1, 2017. The Secretary shall adopt rules
15	under 10 V.S.A. § 1982 on or before January 1, 2018.

18	(a) The commissioner Commissioner may certify a laboratory that meets
19	the standards currently in effect of the National Environmental Laboratory

2	equivalent to perform the testing and monitoring:
3	(1) required under 10 V.S.A. chapter 56 and the federal Safe Drinking

18	(b) Format for notice. The Commissioner shall specify the format for
19	submission of the notice required by subsection (a) of this section, provided
20	that the required format shall be generally consistent with the format for
21	submission of notice in other states with requirements substantially similar to

1	the requirements of this section. Any notice submitted under subsection (a)
2	shall contain the following information:
3	(1) the name of the chemical used or produced and its chemical abstracts
4	service registry number;
5	(2) a description of the product or product component containing the
6	chemical, including: the brand name, the product model, and the universal
7	product code if the product has such a code;

1	(b) Additional chemicals of concern to children. The Commissioner may
2	by rule add additional chemicals to the list of chemicals of high concern to
3	children, provided that the Commissioner of Health, on the basis of the weight
4	of credible independent, peer-reviewed, scientific evidence has research,
5	determined determines that a chemical proposed for addition to the list meets
6	both of the following criteria in subdivisions (1) and (2) of this subsection:
7	(1) The Commissioner of Health has determined that an authoritative
8	governmental entity or accredited research university has demonstrated that the
9	chemical:
10	(A) harms the normal development of a fetus or child or causes other
11	developmental toxicity;
12	(B) causes cancer, genetic damage, or reproductive harm;
13	(C) disrupts the endocrine system;
14	(D) damages the nervous system, immune system, or organs or

5	(1) The Commissioner, upon the recommendation of after consultation
6	with the Chemicals of High Concern to Children Working Group, may adopt a
7	rule to regulate the sale or distribution of a children's product containing a
8	chemical of high concern to children upon a determination that:
9	(A) children will may be exposed to a chemical of high concern to
10	children in the children's product; and
11	(B) there is a probability that, due to the degree of exposure or
12	frequency of exposure of a child to a chemical of high concern to children in a
13	children's product, exposure could cause or contribute to one or more of the
14	adverse health impacts listed under subdivision (b)(1) of this section.
15	(2) In determining whether children will may be exposed to a chemical
16	of high concern in a children's product, the Commissioner shall review
17	available, credible information regarding:
18	(A) the market presence of the children's product in the State;
19	(B) the type or occurrence of exposures to the relevant chemical of
20	high concern to children in the children's product;

1	(C) the household and workplace presence of the children's
2	product; or
3	(D) the potential and frequency of exposure of children to the
4	chemical of high concern to children in the children's product.
5	(3) A rule adopted under this section may:
6	(A) prohibit the children's product containing the chemical of high
7	concern to children from sale, offer for sale, or distribution in the State; or
8	(B) require that the children's product containing the chemical of
9	high concern to children be labeled prior to sale, offer for sale, or distribution
10	in the State.
11	(4) In any rule adopted under this subsection, the Commissioner shall
12	adopt reasonable time frames for manufacturers, distributors, and retailers to
13	comply with the requirements of the rules. No prohibition on sale or
14	manufacture of a children's product in the State shall take effect sooner than
15	two years after the adoption of a rule adopted under this section unless the
16	Commissioner determines that an earlier effective date is required to protect
17	human health and the new effective date is established by rule.

6	(a) This section and Secs. 1 (Intergovernmental Committee on Chemical

9	(b) All other sections shall take effect on July 1, 2018, except that
10	10 V.S.A. § 1982(e) in Sec. 3 shall take effect on passage.
