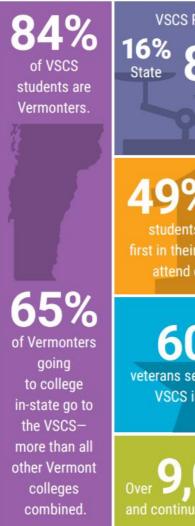


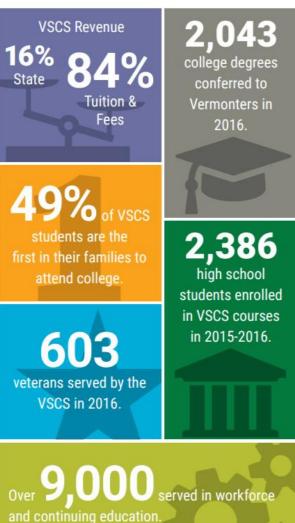

VT State Colleges System: 2016 Impact

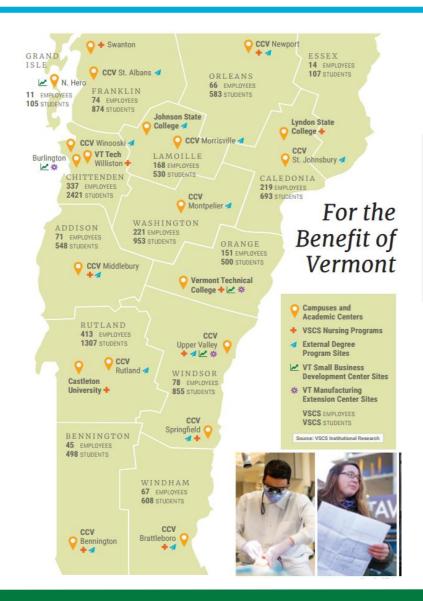

Boosting Enrollment that Leads to Completion

- Increase high school to college continuation rate.
- Improve retention and completion rates.
- Increase pathways to credentials for working age adults.

Initiatives: System Integration for Operating Efficiency

Operating efficiencies to target structural savings

- High-deductible health plan and reduced employer contribution to 403(b) plans: \$2 million
- Unification of Johnson and Lyndon State Colleges: \$2 million
- Consolidation of business functions: \$1 million
- Salaries & wages reduced \$3.6 million from FY14 to FY16
- Total employees reduced 216 from FY13 to FY16

- After five years of demographically-driven admissions declines and graduations of large classes, enrollment appears to be stabilizing.
- Graduate student enrollment at Castleton, Lyndon and Johnson rose by almost 100, from 539 in FY2015 to 632 in FY2016.

FY2018: Why \$4 Million Plus an Inflator?

Financial Stability and Mission

\$4 million will help Vermont address:

Affordability: \$4 million will keep tuition increases at inflationary levels and help students graduate with less debt.

Vermont's college-going gap: Keeping a lid on tuition increases and assuring continued quality educational experiences in the public higher education system will allow more students to attend college in-state.

Workforce development: \$4 million will help us continue building career-ready degree and certificate programs to fill critical workforce gaps in Vermont.

Access to postsecondary opportunities in all corners of Vermont: The VSCS is the first-and sometimes the only-option for most Vermonters going to college in our State.

\$4 million will be used by the VSCS to:

Strengthen finances by eliminating reliance on limited reserves to fund operations.

Support continued progress on our top priorities: enrolling and graduating more Vermonters; serving more working-age adults in our career and continuing education programs to serve Vermont's workforce; and take advantage of administrative efficiencies and increased student opportunities through a more cohesive system.

Incentivize performance of our colleges on enrolling more first-generation, low income Vermont students and increasing on-time graduation rates.

Stave off rises in tuition rates beyond inflationary increases.
