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General Assistance – Emergency Housing



General Assistance-Emergency Housing (GA-EH) provides emergency housing to individuals and families through the use of motels.

This program is administered through DCF's Economic Services Division (ESD).

Emergency Housing Eligibility

To be eligible, a household (an individual or family) must be homeless through no fault of their own; have no other place to stay; have no financial resources to pay for housing; and meet one of the following categories:

<u>Vulnerable</u>: The household has a member who is 65 years of age or older, receives SSI or SSDI, a child age six or younger, or in the third trimester of pregnancy. (28 days in a 12 month period)

<u>Catastrophic</u>: The household experiences a sudden loss of housing due to flood, fire, domestic violence or constructive eviction. (84 days in a 12 month period)

<u>Cold Weather Exception</u>: The above rules are relaxed so that any homeless household is eligible if one of these two weather related events are predicted during the overnight hours:

- a temperature, with or without wind chill, is below 20 degrees
- the temperature is below 32 degrees with a greater than 50% of precipitation.

Vermont Rental Subsidy Program (VRS)

- VRS began in December of 2011.
- State-funded short term (12 month) rental assistance program.
- Clients are generally on Reach Up or SSI or have income less than 125% of FPL.

Challenges

Historically, shelter in a motel was the primary service delivery model. This is a poor model for many reasons:

- Limited access to case management and other resources;
- Challenging conditions for families and individuals, especially for those who require a longer-term stay including:
 - lack of safety,
 - lack of confidentiality and
 - lack of options for food storage and preparation;
- Level of disruption for children;
- Poor outcomes moving households to permanent housing.

The DCF Housing Team is working with housing stakeholders across the state to transform the GA-EH from a **motel-centered voucher program** to a **community-based program** that serves ALL homeless individuals and families through a range of appropriate and effective crisis response tools.

Housing Stakeholders include:

- Policy-makers;
- Homeless Continua of Care and local Housing Review Teams;
- Economic Services District (ESD) Offices;
- AHS Field Directors; and
- Homeless shelter and service providers.

The DCF Housing team has learned through meeting with stakeholders that:

- Communities are very interested in approaches to address crisis housing needs in their locale;
- A coordinated response and creative partnering are key; and
- Motels may still be needed for certain situations.



Parameters for community-based concept:

- Collaboration with local continuum of care;
- Address reliance on motels;
- Incorporate evidence-based/informed approaches from the Family Connections Framework;
- Commit to participation in coordinated intake and assessment.

Emergency Housing Initiative Funding

Projects are GA funded and administered through the Office of Economic Opportunity's (OEO) Housing Opportunity Grant Program (HOP).

Being administered through HOP provides GA with:

- Existing shelter/program standards and requirements

 bringing consistency and uniformity to how DCF
 funds and monitors shelters
- Monitoring processes
- Performance Measures and Reporting
