I have read H.492, and urge you to move it through the legislative process, as I believe it is a good step forward in reducing the documented bias that exists in our law enforcement and correction departments. Having a central board overseeing the collection of data on stops by law enforcement, antibias training and and implementation of fair and impartial law enforcement policies will increase the movement away from unequal treatment of people of color, and toward a more equitable system. Recent high-profile killings of African-Americans in particular has raised awareness of a problem that has been endemic but little-discussed--of differential stops of people of color, and disproportionate use of force during those interactions. The anti-immigrant rabble-rousing that is abroad after the recent national election has also been a wake-up call regarding attitudes in this country against immigration by people of color or of a "different" religion. It is time to take a stand against these benighted attitudes, to make Vermont a better place for all of us. As a parent, I want my children to grow up in a state where the rights of all are protected. I want them and all people to be confident that law enforcement is focused on control of crime, not wasting time with stops based on racial/gender/immigration status/gender identity/perceived national origin or other personal characteristics. I support extension of the CJTC's "Model Fair & Impartial Policing Policy", and I believe that having the proposed Racial Justice Oversight Board will speed up the adoption of that form of policy across the state.

I hope you will listen to the voices of those who support this bill and its goals, and will support its passage.
