6	(a) Creation. There is created the Parentage Study Committee to examine

9	(b) Membership. The Committee shall be composed of the following
10	members:
11	(1) a judge or justice appointed by the Administrative Judge;
12	(2) an attorney appointed by the Commissioner for Children and
