Primary Enforcement Seat Belts

Safety Facts

Traffic deaths are rising across the country. More than 40,000 people died in automobile crashes in 2016, a six percent increase from 2015, (National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, NHTSA).

As of October 2017, there have been 53 traffic fatalities in Vermont, the highest total to date in five years. As fatalities rise seat belt use is declining. Vermont's current seat belt use at 80%, it's lowest since 2004.

Lack of seatbelt use, drugged driving, distracted driving and speeding are the main factors for the increase in fatalities. It is more important than ever to buckle up.



Over the past 5 years 40% of highway fatalities have been either unrestrained or improperly restrained, (NHTSA)



Unbuckled Injuries cost 55% more to treat than are restrained, (NHTSA)

It's estimated that if Vermont passed a primary seat belt law belt usage could increase by 8 percentage points, (NHTSA)

34 States have primary seat belt enforcement


Kids Pay Attention
