11 (a) ~~The Commissioner of Taxes and the~~ Liquor Control Board shall adopt
12 such rules as ~~they deem~~ it deems necessary for the proper administration and
13 collection of the tax imposed under section 422 of this title.

15 Sec. 2. 24 V.S.A. § 1168 is amended to read:

16 § 1168. RETURN OF NAMES OF LISTERS TO DIRECTOR OF THE

17 DIVISION OF PROPERTY VALUATION AND REVIEW

18 After each annual meeting, a town clerk shall report forthwith ~~in writing~~
19 electronically to the Director of the Division of Property Valuation and Review
20 the name of each lister therein, his or her post office address, and the length of

1 his or her term of office. In like manner, ~~such~~ a town clerk shall notify the
2 Director of the Division of Property Valuation and Review of any lister
3 appointed to fill a vacancy.

5 § 3102. CONFIDENTIALITY OF TAX RECORDS

6 (a) No present or former officer, employee, or agent of the Department of
7 Taxes shall disclose any return or return information to any person who is not
8 an officer, employee, or agent of the Department of Taxes except in
9 accordance with the provisions of this section. A person who violates this
10 section shall be fined not more than \$1,000.00 or imprisoned for not more than
11 one year, or both; and if the offender is an officer or employee of this State, he
12 or she shall, in addition, be dismissed from office and be incapable of holding
13 any public office for a period of five years thereafter.

14 (b) The following definitions shall apply for purposes of this ~~section~~
15 chapter:

16 (1) "Person" shall include any individual, firm, partnership, association,
17 joint stock company, corporation, trust, estate, or other entity.

18 (2) "Return" means any tax return, declaration of estimated tax, license
19 application, report, or similar document, including attachments, schedules, and
20 transmittals, filed with the Department of Taxes.

1 (3) “Return information” includes a person’s name, address, date of
2 birth, Social Security or federal identification number or any other identifying
3 number; information as to whether or not a return was filed or required to be
4 filed; the nature, source or amount of a person’s income, payments, receipts,
5 deductions, exemptions, credits, assets, liabilities, net worth, tax liabilities, tax
6 payments, deficiencies or over-assessments; and any other data, from any
7 source, furnished to or prepared or collected by the Department of Taxes with
8 respect to any person.

9 (4) “Tax administration” means the verification of a tax return or claim
10 for credit, rebate or refund; the investigation, assessment, determination,
11 litigation or collection of a tax liability of any person; the investigation or
12 prosecution of a tax-related crime; or the enforcement of a tax statute.

13 (5) “Commissioner” means the Commissioner of Taxes appointed
14 under section 3101 of this title or any officer, employee or agent of the
15 Department of Taxes authorized by the Commissioner (directly or indirectly by
16 one or more redelegations of authority) to perform any function of the
17 Commissioner.

18 (6) “State” means any sovereign body politic, including the United
19 States, any state or territory thereof, and any foreign country or state or
20 province thereof.

2 considered a designee of the taxpayer under 26 U.S.C. § 6103(c). The
3 signature of a notary public shall not be required for a person to be considered
4 an “authorized representative.”

6 (e) The Commissioner may, in his or her discretion and subject to such
7 conditions and requirements as he or she may provide, including any
8 confidentiality requirements of the Internal Revenue Service, disclose a return
9 or return information:

11 (17) To the Department of Financial Regulation, if such return or
12 return information relates to the tax on premiums of captive insurance
13 companies contained in 8 V.S.A. chapter 141, to the tax on surplus lines under
14 8 V.S.A. § 5035, to the tax on the direct placement of insurance under 8 V.S.A.
15 § 5036, or to the tax on insurance premiums under section 8551 of this title.

16 (18) To the Agency of Natural Resources, if such return or return
17 information relates to the tax on hazardous waste under chapter 237 of this
18 title, or to the franchise tax on waste facilities under subchapter 13 of chapter
19 151 of this title.

1 Sec. 5. 32 V.S.A. § 9243(a) is amended to read:

2 (a) Where the meals and rooms tax liability under this chapter for the
3 immediately preceding full calendar year has been (or would have been in
4 cases when the business was not operating for the entire year) \$500.00 or less,
5 the gross receipts taxes imposed by this chapter shall be due and payable in
6 quarterly installments on or before the 25th day of the calendar month
7 succeeding the quarter ending the last day of March, June, September, and
8 December of each year. In all other cases, the gross receipts tax imposed by
9 this chapter shall be due and payable monthly on or before the 25th (23rd of
10 February) day of the month following the month for which the tax is due. The
11 Commissioner may authorize payment of the tax due by electronic funds
12 transfer. The Commissioner may require payment by electronic funds transfer
13 from any taxpayer who is required by federal tax law to pay any federal tax in
14 that manner, or from any taxpayer who has submitted to the Department of

3 Commissioner. Payment of taxes by electronic funds transfer does not affect
4 the requirement to file returns.

20 The Commissioner of Taxes shall establish a personnel security program
21 that ensures an initial background investigation is completed at the appropriate

1 level for any prospective employee or contractor of the Department of Taxes
2 who will have access to federal tax information. The Commissioner shall
3 establish this program in conformity with IRS Publication 1075. The
4 Commissioner shall comply with the requirements of 21 V.S.A. § 495j when
5 conducting a background investigation of any prospective employee. The
6 Commissioner shall adopt rules to implement its personnel security program.

9 § 2143. NONPROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

10 (a) Notwithstanding the provisions of this chapter, a nonprofit
11 organization, as defined in ~~32 V.S.A. § 10201(5)~~ 31 V.S.A. § 1201(5), may
12 organize and execute, and an individual may participate in lotteries, raffles or
13 other games of chance for the purpose of raising funds to be used in charitable,
14 religious, educational, and civic undertakings or used by fraternal
15 organizations to provide direct support to charitable, religious, educational, or
16 civic undertakings with which they are affiliated. Except as provided in
17 subsection (d) of this section, gambling machines and other mechanical
18 devices described in section 2135 of this title shall not be utilized under
19 authority of this section.

21 (d) Casino events shall be limited as follows:

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(2) A location that is owned by a nonprofit, as defined in ~~32 V.S.A.~~
~~§ 10201(5)~~ 31 V.S.A. § 1201(5), may be the site of no more than three casino
events in any calendar quarter and no more than 12 casino events in any
calendar year as long as there are at least 15 days between each event.

(3) A nonprofit organization, as defined in ~~32 V.S.A. § 10201(5)~~
31 V.S.A. § 1201(5), may organize and execute no more than:

(A) one casino event in any calendar quarter; or

(B) three casino events in any calendar year, as long as there are at
least 15 days between each event.

(e) Games of chance shall be limited as follows:

* * *

(6) A nonprofit organization shall not organize and execute games of
chance on more than two days in any calendar week, nor shall games of chance
be organized and executed at any location on more than two days in any
calendar week, except that:

(A) Casino events may be conducted only as permitted under
subsection (d) of this section.

(B) Break-open tickets may be purchased and distributed only as
provided in ~~32 V.S.A. chapter 239~~ 31 V.S.A. chapter 23.

1 (C) A nonprofit organization may organize and execute games of
2 chance on three consecutive days not more than twice in any calendar year as
3 long as there are at least 90 days between each event.

4 (D) Agricultural fairs qualified to receive a State stipend pursuant
5 to 31 V.S.A. § 617 may organize and execute games of chance for not more
6 than 12 consecutive days during the fair once each calendar year.

7 (E) A nonprofit organization may organize and execute games of
8 chance at a location used by another nonprofit organization which results in the
9 location being used on more than two days a week if all the nonprofit
10 organizations using the location were in existence as of January 1, 1994, and
11 are not affiliated with each other or under common control.

14 CHAPTER 23. GAMES OF CHANCE

15 § 1201. DEFINITIONS

16 As used in this chapter:

17 (1) “Break-open ticket” means a lottery utilizing a card or ticket of the
18 so-called pickle card, jar ticket, or break-open variety commonly bearing the
19 name “Lucky 7,” “Nevada Club,” “Victory Bar,” “Texas Poker,” “Triple
20 Bingo,” or any other name.

21 (2) “Commissioner” means the Commissioner of Liquor Control.

1 (3)(A) “Distributor” means a person that purchases break-open tickets
2 from a manufacturer and sells or distributes break-open tickets at wholesale in
3 Vermont. “Distributor” shall include any officer, employee, or agent of a
4 corporation or dissolved corporation that has a duty to act for the corporation
5 in complying with the requirements of this chapter.

6 (B) “Distributor” shall not include a person who distributes only
7 jar tickets that are used only for merchandise prizes.

8 (4) “Manufacturer” means a person that designs, assembles, fabricates,
9 produces, constructs, or who otherwise prepares a break-open ticket for sale to
10 a distributor.

11 (5) “Nonprofit organization” means a nonprofit corporation that is
12 qualified for tax exempt status under I.R.C. § 501(c), as amended, and that has
13 engaged, in good faith, in charitable, religious, educational, or civic activities
14 in Vermont on a regular basis during the preceding year. “Nonprofit
15 organization” also includes churches, schools, fire departments, municipalities,
16 fraternal organizations, and organizations that operate agricultural fairs or field
17 days, and that have engaged, in good faith, in charitable, religious, educational,
18 or civic activities in Vermont on a regular basis during the preceding year.

19 § 1202. LICENSE REQUIRED

20 (a) Manufacture. Break-open tickets sold in Vermont shall be
21 manufactured only by a person licensed by the Commissioner. A licensed

1 manufacturer shall sell break-open tickets only to distributors licensed under
2 this chapter. A distributor licensed under this chapter shall purchase break-
3 open tickets only from a manufacturer licensed under this chapter.

4 (b) Distribution. A distributor who sells or distributes break-open tickets
5 for resale in Vermont shall be licensed by the Commissioner, and shall also be:

6 (1) a natural person who is a resident of Vermont;

7 (2) a partnership in which the majority of partners are residents of
8 Vermont;

9 (3) a corporation incorporated under the laws of Vermont, provided
10 that a majority of the ownership interest is held by residents of Vermont; or

11 (4) a person who is not a resident of Vermont and whose state of
12 residence allows residents or corporations of Vermont to distribute break-open
13 tickets in that state under similar terms and conditions as provided under this
14 chapter.

15 § 1203. DISTRIBUTION; RETAIL PURCHASE AND SALE

16 (a) Only nonprofit organizations may purchase break-open tickets from a
17 distributor licensed under this chapter.

18 (b) No person, other than a licensed distributor or a nonprofit organization
19 acting under subsection (f) of this section, shall distribute a box of break-open
20 tickets. No person shall distribute a box of break-open tickets unless the box

1 bears indicia as required by the Commissioner. No person shall distribute or
2 sell a break-open ticket at retail unless the ticket bears a unique serial number.

3 (c) A distributor licensed under this chapter may sell break-open tickets
4 only to nonprofit organizations as defined in subdivision 1201(5) of this
5 chapter, except that a person other than a licensed distributor may sell such
6 tickets to a licensed distributor upon written approval of the Commissioner.

7 (d) Only nonprofit organizations may sell break-open tickets at retail.

8 (e) Break-open tickets shall not be sold at premises licensed to sell
9 alcoholic beverages except:

10 (1) at clubs as defined in 7 V.S.A. § 2(7); or

11 (2) a nonprofit organization may sell break-open tickets at premises
12 licensed to sell alcoholic beverages if, notwithstanding 13 V.S.A. § 2143(e) of
13 this chapter, all proceeds from the sale of break-open tickets are used by the
14 nonprofit organization exclusively for charitable, religious, educational, and
15 civic undertakings, with only the following costs deducted from the proceeds:

16 (A) actual cost of the break-open tickets;

17 (B) the prizes awarded;

18 (C) reasonable legal fees necessary to organize the nonprofit
19 organization and to ensure compliance with all legal requirements; and

20 (D) reasonable accounting fees necessary to account for the proceeds
21 from the sale of break-open tickets.

1 (f) A nonprofit organization selling break-open tickets at a premises
2 licensed to sell alcoholic beverages under subdivision (e)(2) of this section
3 must purchase the break-open tickets directly from a distributor. The nonprofit
4 organization shall report to the Department of Liquor Control on a quarterly
5 basis the number of tickets purchased and distributed at premises that serve
6 alcohol, and the corresponding serial numbers of those tickets, the amount of
7 revenue realized by the nonprofit organization, and the amounts accounted for
8 under subdivisions (e)(2)(A)–(D) of this section. As part of its reporting
9 requirement, the nonprofit shall also identify how it qualifies as a nonprofit
10 organization under the definitions in this chapter. The nonprofit organization
11 shall also provide the names of any individual members or employees who
12 handle the sale of break-open tickets or the reporting requirements under this
13 subsection for the organization. The persons identified by the organization in
14 this subsection shall not be employees or owners of the premises where alcohol
15 is served. If the Department of Liquor Control determines that a nonprofit
16 organization has failed to comply with the requirements of this subsection, the
17 Department of Liquor Control shall notify the nonprofit organization and any
18 licensed distributors of this failure, and any licensed distributor that continues
19 to sell break-open tickets to that nonprofit organization after notice shall be
20 considered in violation of the requirements of this chapter.

1 (g) The provisions of this chapter regarding sales and purchases of break-
2 open tickets also apply to transfers of break-open tickets for no charge.

3 § 1204. LICENSE REQUIREMENTS; FEES

4 (a) Upon application and payment of the fee, the Commissioner may issue
5 the following licenses to qualified applicants:

6 (1) Manufacturer annual license: \$3,000.00

7 (2) Distributor annual license: \$2,000.00

8 (b) A license shall not be granted to an individual who has been convicted
9 of a felony within five years of the license application nor to an entity in which
10 any partner, officer, or director has been convicted of a felony within five years
11 of the application.

12 (c) Licenses issued under this section may be renewed annually on
13 October 1, upon reapplication and payment of the licensing fee.

14 (d) All fees collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited into the
15 Liquor Control Enterprise Fund.

16 § 1205. RECORDS; REPORT

17 (a) Each distributor and manufacturer licensed under this chapter shall
18 maintain records and books relating to the distribution and sale of break-open
19 tickets and to any other expenditure required by the Commissioner. A licensee
20 shall make its records and books available to the Commissioner for auditing.

1 (b) Each licensed distributor shall file with the Commissioner on the same
2 schedule as the distributor files sales tax returns the following information for
3 the preceding reporting period:

4 (1) The names of organizations to which boxes of break-open tickets
5 were sold.

6 (2) The number of boxes of break-open tickets sold to each
7 organization.

8 (3) The ticket denomination and serial numbers of tickets for each box.

9 (c) Records and reports filed under this section shall be designated
10 confidential unless, under State or federal law or regulation, the record or
11 information may be disclosed to specifically designated persons.

12 (d) Notwithstanding subsection (c) of this section, the Commissioner of
13 Liquor Control shall provide the records and reports filed under this section to
14 the Attorney General, upon request.

15 § 1206. ENFORCEMENT

16 (a) Any person who intentionally violates section 1203 of this chapter
17 shall be fined not more than \$500.00.

18 (b) Any person who intentionally violates section 1202, 1204, or 1205 of
19 this title shall be fined not more than \$10,000.00 for the first offense and fined
20 not more than \$20,000.00 or imprisoned not more than one year, or both, for
21 each subsequent offense.

1 (c) In addition to the criminal penalties provided under subsections (a) and
2 (b) of this section, any person who violates a provision of this chapter shall be
3 subject to one or more of the following penalties:

4 (1) Revocation or suspension by the Commissioner of a license granted
5 pursuant to this chapter.

6 (2) Confiscation of break-open tickets or confiscation of the revenues
7 derived from the sale of those tickets, or both.

8 § 1207. APPEALS

9 Any licensee aggrieved by an action taken under subsection 1206(c) of this
10 chapter and any person aggrieved by the Commissioner's refusal to issue or
11 renew a license under this chapter may appeal in writing to the Commissioner
12 for review of such action. The Commissioner shall thereafter grant a hearing
13 subject to the provisions of 3 V.S.A. chapter 25 upon the matter and notify the
14 aggrieved person in writing of his or her determination. The Commissioner's
15 determination may be appealed within 30 days to the Washington Superior
16 Court or the Superior Court of the county in which the taxpayer resides or has
17 a place of business.

18 § 1208. RULEMAKING

19 The Department of Liquor Control may regulate the licensing and reporting
20 requirements of manufacturers and distributors of break-open tickets under this
21 chapter. The Commissioner of Liquor Control may adopt rules for licensure

1 and indicia for boxes of break-open tickets, for record keeping relating to the
2 distribution and sale of break-open tickets, and the remittance of net proceeds
3 from sales of break-open tickets to the intended eligible charitable recipients.
4 The rules shall permit no proceeds to be retained by the operators of for-profit
5 bars, except for:

6 (1) the actual cost of the break-open tickets;

7 (2) the prizes awarded; and

8 (3) any sales tax due on the sale of break-open tickets under 32 V.S.A.

14 Sec. 15. HEALTH INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY REPORT

15 (a) The Secretary of Administration and the Secretary of the Agency of
16 Human Services shall conduct a comprehensive review of the State's Health-
17 IT Fund established by 32 V.S.A. § 10301, Health Information Technology
18 Plan established by 18 V.S.A. § 9351, and Vermont Information Technology
19 Leaders established by 18 V.S.A. § 9352.

20 (b) The report shall:

21 (1) review the need for a State sponsored Health-IT Fund;

1 (2) review how past payments from the fund have or have not promoted
2 the advancement of health information technology adoption and utilization in
3 Vermont;

4 (3) review the past development, approval process, and use of the
5 Vermont Health Information Technology Plan;

6 (4) review the Vermont Information Technology Leaders (VITL)
7 organization, including its maintaining and operating Vermont's Health
8 Information Exchange and the organization's ability to support current and
9 future health reform goals;

10 (5) recommend whether to continue the Health-IT Fund, including with
11 its current revenue source as set forth in 32 V.S.A § 10402;

12 (6) recommend any changes to the structure of VITL, including whether
13 it should be a public or private entity, and any other proposed modifications to
14 18 V.S.A § 9352;

15 (7) review property and ownership of the VHIE, including identifying
16 all specific tangible and intangible assets that comprise or support the VHIE
17 (especially in regards to VITL's current and previous agreements with the
18 State), and the funding sources used to create this property; and

19 (8) recommend any accounting or financial actions the State should take
20 in regards to State-owned tangible and intangible assets that comprise or
21 support the VHIE.

1 (c) On or before November 15, 2017, the Secretary of Administration and
2 the Secretary of the Agency of Human Services shall submit this report to the
3 House Committees on Health Care, on Appropriations, on Energy and
4 Technology, and on Ways and Means and the Senate Committees on Health
5 and Welfare, on Appropriations, and on Finance.

8 CHAPTER 245. HEALTH CARE FUND CONTRIBUTION

9 ASSESSMENT

10 § 10501. PURPOSE

11 For the purpose of more equitably distributing the costs of health care to
12 uninsured residents of this State, an employers' health care fund contribution is
13 established to provide a fair and reasonable method for sharing health care
14 costs with employers that do not offer their employees health care coverage
15 and employers that offer insurance but whose employees enroll in Medicaid.

16 § 10502. DEFINITIONS

17 As used in this chapter:

18 (1) "Employee" means an individual who is:

19 (A) 18 years of age or older for all of a calendar quarter,

20 (B) employed full-time or part-time, and

1 (C) reported by an employer for purposes of complying with
2 Vermont unemployment compensation law pursuant to 21 V.S.A. chapter 17.

3 (2) “Employer” means a person who is required to furnish
4 unemployment insurance coverage pursuant to 21 V.S.A. chapter 17.

5 (3)(A) “Full-time equivalent” or “FTE” means the number of employees
6 expressed as the number of employee hours worked during a calendar quarter
7 divided by 520. The FTE calculation shall be based on a 40-hour work week.
8 No more than one FTE may be assessed against an individual employee,
9 regardless of the actual number of hours worked by that employee during the
10 calendar quarter.

11 (B) The hours worked during a calendar quarter means hours worked
12 during all pay periods in that quarter for which gross wages were reported and
13 paid. Unworked hours, such as vacation or sick time, may be excluded from
14 the FTE calculation.

15 (C) “Full-time equivalent” shall not include any employee hours
16 attributable to a seasonal employee or part-time employee of an employer who
17 offers health care coverage to all of its regular full-time employees, provided
18 that the seasonal employee or part-time employee has health care coverage
19 under either a private plan or any public plan except Medicaid.

20 (4) “Health care coverage” shall mean any private or public plan that
21 includes both hospital and physician services.

1 (5) “Part-time employee” shall mean an employee who works for an
2 employer for fewer than 30 hours a week or fewer than 390 hours in a calendar
3 quarter.
