Sec. 1. 16 V.S.A. § 255(k) and (l) are added to read:

(k) The requirements of this section shall not apply to persons operating or employed by a child care facility that is prequalified to provide prekindergarten education pursuant to section 829 of this title and that is required to be licensed by the Department for Children and Families pursuant to 33 V.S.A § 3502.

(l) The requirements of this section shall not apply with respect to a school district's partners in any program authorized or student placement created by chapter 23, subchapter 2 of this title. It is provided, however, that superintendents are not prohibited from requiring a fingerprint supported record check pursuant to district policy with respect to its partners in such programs.

Sec. 2. EDUCATION WEIGHTING REPORT

(a) The Agency of Education, the Joint Fiscal Office, and the Office of Legislative Council, in consultation with the Secretary of Human Services, the Vermont Superintendent's Association, the Vermont School Boards

1 Association, and the Vermont National Education Association, shall consider
2 and make recommendations on the criteria used for determining weighted
3 long-term membership of a school district under 16 V.S.A. § 4010, including
4 the following.

5 (1) The current weighting factors and any supporting evidence or basis
6 in the historical record for these factors.

7 (2) The relationship between each of the current weighting factors and
8 the quality and equity of educational outcomes for students.

20 for State Legislatures, and research conducted by higher education institutions
21 working on identifying rural or urban education financing factors.

1 (b) In addition to considering and making recommendations on the criteria

20 Sec. 7. FINDINGS AND PURPOSE

1 (a) 2015 Acts and Resolves No. 46 established a multi-year, phased process
2 that provides multiple opportunities for school districts to unify existing
3 governance units into more “sustainable governance structures” designed to
4 meet the General Assembly’s identified educational and fiscal goals while
5 recognizing and reflecting local priorities. It has been the General Assembly’s
6 intent to revitalize Vermont’s small schools – to promote equity in their
7 offerings and stability in their finances – through these changes in governance.

8 (b) While Vermont generally does an excellent job educating our children,
9 we fall short in two critical areas. First, we are not as successful as we need to
10 be in educating children from families with low income, and second, while we
11 have a very high graduation rate from our high schools, not enough of our
12 graduates continue their education. Fulfilling the goals of Act 46 is a critical
13 step in addressing these shortcomings.

14 (c) As of Town Meeting Day 2017, voters in 96 Vermont towns have voted
15 to merge 104 school districts into these slightly larger, more sustainable
16 governance structures, resulting in the creation of 20 new unified union
17 districts (serving prekindergarten–grade 12 students). As a result,
18 approximately 60 percent of Vermont’s school-age children live or will soon
19 live in districts that satisfy the goals of Act 46.

20 (d) These slightly larger, more flexible unified union districts have begun
21 to realize distinct benefits, including the ability to offer kindergarten–grade 8

1 choice among elementary schools within the new district boundaries; greater
2 flexibility in sharing students, staff, and resources among individual schools;
3 the elimination of bureaucratic redundancies; and the flexibility to create
4 magnet academies, focusing on a particular area of specialization by school.

5 (e) Significant areas of the State, however, have experienced difficulty
6 satisfying the goals of Act 46. The range of complications is varied, including
7 operating or tuitioning models that differ among adjoining districts, geographic
8 isolation due to lengthy driving times or inhospitable travel routes between
9 proposed merger partners, and greatly differing levels of debt per equalized
10 pupil between districts involved in merger study committees.

11 (f) This act is designed to make useful changes to the merger time lines and
12 allowable governance structures under Act 46 without weakening or
