## What is the American Civil Liberties Union of Vermont (ACLU-VT)?

ACLU-VT is a non-profit advocacy and public education organization dedicated to defending the constitutional and civil rights of Vermonters. In a variety of subject matter areas, we seek to strengthen the liberties enshrined in the United States and Vermont Constitutions through lobbying, litigation, and public education.<sup>i</sup>

## What are the ACLU-VT's priorities for Vermont?

- <u>Criminal Justice Reform</u>: Despite substantial progress in recent years, Vermont still has work to do to reduce incarceration and protect people's freedom. The ACLU-VT is joining the national Campaign for Smart Justice to win lasting criminal justice reform – including police oversight, fair treatment of low-income communities and people of color, and an end to mass incarceration.
- 2) <u>Privacy</u>: Protecting Vermonters' right to privacy amidst technological advancements and the proliferation of law enforcement surveillance tools.
- 3) <u>Open and Accountable Government</u>: Strengthening the democratic process by holding public officials and bodies to the highest standards modernizing open meetings law, enhancing access to public records,<sup>ii</sup> strict conflict of interest rules, candidate financial disclosures, and a state ethics commission.
- Protecting Vulnerable Populations: Defending the most vulnerable among us children, low-income families, homeless individuals, minority religious faiths, people with disabilities, immigrants, among others – to ensure that constitutional and civil rights are enjoyed by *all* Vermont residents.

## ACLU-VT Priority Issues for the 2017-18 Biennium

- Police Body Camera Policy (**reject unless significant changes**)
- State Ethics Commission and Financial Disclosure (support)
- Upgrading Open Meeting and Public Records Law (support)
- Roadside Saliva Testing for Drugged Driving (reject)
- Police Decertification Updates (H.22)(general support with minor changes)
- Criminal and Youth Justice Reform (e.g. police use of force data collection, bail reform, sentencing reductions, prison population reduction, prison addiction treatment)
- Countering the Trump Administration's potential assault on individual rights
