Vermont Intern Program

A program of Vermont Businesses for Social Responsibility, the Vermont Intern Program is funded by the Vermont Department of Labor's Workforce Education and Training Fund with support from UVM Continuing Distance and Education. Our purpose is to expose young people in Vermont to the diversity of career opportunities in the state.

Program Success (2013 data):

- Pre-screened over 500 applications and placed 41 students and recent graduates in high quality PAID internships
- Worked with 75 Vermont businesses across the state to create internship opportunities, 60% of which were new participants in the program
