

Best Practices for Schools Regarding Local Implementation of SBE Rules 4101 and 4102 - "Student Safety"

All Vermont School Districts should develop and maintain a "school specific" Emergency Operations Plan (EOP) that conforms to the principles of the National Incident Management System, and as applicable, that is aligned with the Vermont School Crisis Planning Guide. This plan should be reviewed and updated annually by school leadership and should include the essential procedures, operations and assignments that are required to plan, prepare, mitigate, respond and recover from an emergency/disaster.

Districts are also encouraged to work with their emergency first response community and local/regional emergency management officials to assist in the development of the school's EOP. Please refer to the Vermont School Crisis Planning Guide for more information on how to best identify these emergency response offices.

Each School Crisis Team should work with its local first response community and local/regional emergency management partners to determine the threats and vulnerabilities that are specific to each school. As explained in the Vermont School Crisis Planning Guide, these threats and vulnerabilities shall include but are not limited to: fire, power outage, bomb threat, active shooter, hazardous materials release, flooding, and other weather related events.

In the absence of a fully developed EOP, each school should utilize the Vermont School Crisis Planning Guide as their school's EOP.





Video Exercises

These exercises are designed to walk your School Crisis Team through an emergency based scenario and discuss the policy, plans and procedures that your school would use to address the situation. Throughout the exercise, you will be presented with questions that your School Crisis Team should answer prior to proceeding.





Standard Response Protocol

EMERGENCY PROTOCOLS

LOCKOUT Secure the Perimeter

- Students Return to
- inside of building(s Continue with classes
- account for students

of sight Silence cell phones

LOCKDOWN

Turn off lights

Account for students Wait for emergency responders

"Locks, Lights and Out of Sight"

Lock the classroom/office door

- Leave things behind Form single-file lines Move calmly to exits
- Move to a safe place and get out
 - Faculty/Staff lead students to evacuation location Account for all students/staff

SHELTER

- Seek shelter if outside · Turn off all fans and air conditioners if possible Stay inside until informed

BOMB THREAT OR SUSPCIOUS OBJECT

- Do NOT touch or attempt to move any suspicious object
- Scan area for other suspicious objects · Do NOT use cellular phone near object
- · Immediately leave the area
- Report information to your school
- If safe to do so, advise others to avoid the area
- · Listen to instructions of emergency

MISSING STUDENT

- Verify student attendance or missing status Notify school administrator
- Overhead announce for student to report to
- Call 911 Establish perimeter confinement of school
- Conduct a rapid ground search by school staff Determine who last saw missing student and
- try to protect location from contamination Have physical/clothing description and photo available for first responders

EARTHQUAKE

- If inside, stand in a doorway or under sturdy furniture
- Avoid windows, hanging objects or tall furniture which can topple over
- Stay where you are until shaking stops When shaking stops, evacuate building. Do NOT use elevators
- If outside, move to a clear area away from trees, poles or buildings

MEDICAL EMERGENCY

- Immediately call 9-1-1 Notify school nurse
- . Do not attempt to move injured person(s) Provide as much information as possible to
- . Follow instructions of the 9-1-1 operator
- · Provide the care you are competent or trained to provide
- Stay with the victim until assistance arrives

POWER OUTAGE

- . Be aware of downed electrical wires
- Follow instructions of your school administrator or emergency personnel
- Unplug any voltage sensitive equipment
- If instructed to evacuate, move cautiously towards illuminated exit signs
- Do not use elevators

SUSPICIOUS ACTIVITY

- If you witness a suspicious person or activity, immediately call your school administrator or
- Provide as much detail as possible (location, description)
- . Do not confront anyone
- · Maintain a safe distance from individual(s)



VERMONT AGENCY OF EDUCATION

VIOLENT INTRUDER **ACTIVE SHOOTER**

- Quickly assess the situation and immediately inform others of the threat
- Determine your response actions If the school is placed in "lockdown" find a
- safe place to hide Once in a safe location and only if safe to
- do so, contact 9-1-1 and follow instructions . If in a "lockdown" do not leave your position until emergency personnel or your school administrator gives the all dear
- Depending on the situation and the location of the threat, consider evacuating the building

FIRE / FIRE ALARM

- If you hear the fire alarm, leave the building
- If you see or smell smoke, pull the fire alarm as you exit the building
- If school is in "lockdown" assess the situation to determine fire hazard before evacuating
- Do NOT re-enter the building until advised by emergency responders or your school

WEATHER EMERGENCY

- If outside, seek shelter immediately Be aware of downed wires and falling
- Close doors and windows
- Avoid being next to windows as much as possible . Stay inside until storm has passed
- · Follow instructions of security or other school








2016 School Safety Survey

- Assessment of where schools are and requested initiatives
- 82% of Supervisory Unions responded
- Biggest takeaways:
 - 37% of school leadership have Incident Command System training
 - 34% of schools have a Behavioral Threat Assessment Team
 - 33% of schools have a family re-unification plan
 - 8% were aware of the School Safety Center website
 - 5% of School Public Safety Teams have representation from Mental Health



Upcoming Initiatives to Address Gaps

- Incident Command System
 - If Supervisory Union can get minimum, training will be scheduled
 - Spring ICS 402 offerings (dual purpose)
- Reunification
 - 2 recent Table Top Exercises
 - Vermont School Crisis Planning Team working on template

- Website
 - Directing traffic (Weekly Field Memo, DEMHS & AOE websites, event emails)
 - Advertising at all meetings
- Mental Health
 - Behavioral Threat Assessment –
 Public Safety Team membership
 - Educate stakeholders on importance of participation
