Post Secondary Education (PSE) and Transportation in the Reach Up Program

PSE helps parents in lowincome families obtain two-orfouryear college degrees.

Currently, 105 PSE participants receive:

- Financial grant (same as Reach Up)
- Case management support
- Help with childcare, transportation, and school supplies



Vermont's PSE Program Results

- 59% of PSE leavers, vs. 45% of Reach Up leavers worked consistently throughout the year after leaving the respective programs
- Median earnings of PSE leavers = \$20,703, while median earnings of Reach Up leavers = \$11,736
- 19% of PSE leavers return to Reach Up, vs. 31% of Reach Up leavers
- PSE leavers were more than twice as likely as Reach Up leavers to earn at least \$20,000/year.

What is preventing **Reach Up** participants from participating in PSE?

Program Rules/Policies

- ★ Eligibility for PSE program did not always align with college admissions
- ★ Unapproved absence from PSE; not allowed to return
- ★Application process too cumbersome (forms, forms, and more forms)
- Benefit amount too low

Statutory Limitations

- Challenges specific to 2-parent families:
 - 1. Statute only allows participation of one parent
 - 2. Statute requires 2nd parent to be working, which often makes family financially ineligible for PSE

Other Barriers to Participation:

- No High School diploma, or not college-ready (academically)
- Physical/mental health, childcare availability and affordability, transportation, and housing
- Current student loan debt

- Cut the costs
- Create slack
- Reframe and empower

Improvements to PSE

Cut Costs

- Reduced three separate forms to one, and cut the number of pages in half
- Simplified application process
- Relaxed documentation requirements
- Simplified process to change major

Create Slack

- Financial eligibility period changed from last calendar year to last thirty day period
- Rolling admissions into PSE
- Leave of absence policy revised to allow second chance

Reframe and Empower

- Participant focus groups
- Non-participating parent in two-parent family no longer required to work with VR

Transportation

- Nearly 40% of Reach Up participants report that transportation prevents them from getting or keeping a job
- This includes one or more of the following:
 - No license
 - No car or access to adequate public transportation
 - Fines, tickets
 - Needing Impaired Driver Rehabilitation Program

Transportation – What Reach Up Does: Purchase about 60 cars a year for participants through Good News Garage

From 2013 to 2015:

- 135 out of 196 (69%) clients were employed at the time they received the car
- 89 out of 135 (66%) clients that were employed at the time they received the car are still employed (compared to 45% of RU "leavers" who have income in all four quarters after leaving RU)
- Contract with Capstone Community Action to facilitate Financial Education and Car Workshops
- Provide rides through Ready To Go (Good News Garage)

What else can be done?

- Fine forgiveness days
- Other pathways for fine forgiveness or reduction
- Streamline processes to pay off fines and tickets
- More options for car ownership
