8	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
9	Sec. A.100 SHORT TITLE
10	(a) This bill may be referred to as the BIG BILL – Fiscal Year 2021
11	Appropriations Act.
12	Sec. A.101 PURPOSE
13	(a) The purpose of this act is to provide appropriations for the operations of
14	State government during fiscal year 2021. It is the express intent of the
15	General Assembly that activities of the various agencies, departments,
16	divisions, boards, and commissions be limited to those that can be supported
17	by funds appropriated in this act or other acts passed prior to June 30, 2020.
18	Agency and department heads are directed to implement staffing and service

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1	levels in fiscal year 2021 so as to meet this condition unless otherwise directed		
2	by specific language in this act or other acts of the General Assembly.		
3	Sec. A.102 APPROPRIATIONS		
4	(a) It is the intent of the General Assembly that this act serves as the		
5	primary source and reference for appropriations for fiscal year 2021.		
6	(b) The sums herein stated are appropriated for the purposes specified in		
7	the following sections of this act. When no time is expressly stated during		
8	which any of the appropriations are to continue, the appropriations are single-		
9	year appropriations and only for the purpose indicated and shall be paid from		
10	funds shown as the source of funds. If in this act there is an error in either		
11	addition or subtraction, the totals shall be adjusted accordingly. Apparent		
12	errors in referring to section numbers of statutory titles within this act may be		
13	disregarded by the Commissioner of Finance and Management.		
14	(c) Unless codified or otherwise specified, all narrative portions of this act		
15	apply only to the fiscal year ending on June 30, 2021.		
16	Sec. A.102.1 RELATIONSHIP WITH 2020 ACTS AND RESOLVES		
17	NO. 120; REPEALS		
18	(a) In order to respond promptly to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic		
19	on the State of Vermont and its economy, the General Assembly enacted 2020		
20	Acts and Resolves No. 120 in July 2020 to support the operations of State		
21	government during the first quarter of fiscal year 2021. Since that time, it has		

1	become apparent that it is preferable to enact appropriations to support the
2	operations of State government for the entirety of fiscal year 2021, and certain
3	appropriations from 2020 Acts and Resolves No. 120 must be repealed as set
4	forth in subsection (b) of this section in order to provide for the full-year
5	appropriations.
6	(b) The following are repealed on October 1, 2020:
7	(1) 2020 Acts and Resolves No. 120, Sec. A.3(a) (appropriations for the
8	first quarter of fiscal year 2021);
9	(2) 2020 Acts and Resolves No. 120, Sec. A.4 (Phase I prorated
10	appropriations fiscal year 2021 first quarter);
11	(3) the language following 2020 Acts and Resolves No. 120, Sec. A.6
12	but preceding Sec. A.7 (budgetary specifications and amounts); and
13	(4) 2020 Acts and Resolves No. 120, Sec. A.54(b) (narrative portions
14	apply only to first quarter of fiscal year 2021).
15	(c) In the event of a conflict between the provisions of this act and the
16	provisions of 2020 Acts and Resolves No. 120, the provisions of this act shall
17	control.
18	Sec. A.103 DEFINITIONS
19	(a) As used in this act:
20	(1) "Encumbrances" means a portion of an appropriation reserved for
21	the subsequent payment of existing purchase orders or contracts. The

Sec. A.106 FEDERAL FUNDS

Commissioner of Finance and Management shall make final decisions on the
appropriateness of encumbrances.
(2) "Grants" means subsidies, aid, or payments to local governments, to
community and quasi-public agencies for providing local services, and to
persons who are not wards of the State for services or supplies and means cash
or other direct assistance, including pension contributions.
(3) "Operating expenses" means property management; repair and
maintenance; rental expenses; insurance; postage; travel; energy and utilities;
office and other supplies; equipment, including motor vehicles, highway
materials, and construction; expenditures for the purchase of land and
construction of new buildings and permanent improvements; and similar items.
(4) "Personal services" means wages and salaries, fringe benefits, per
diems, contracted third-party services, and similar items.
Sec. A.104 RELATIONSHIP TO EXISTING LAWS
(a) Except as specifically provided, this act shall not be construed in any
way to negate or impair the full force and effect of existing laws.
Sec. A.105 OFFSETTING APPROPRIATIONS
(a) In the absence of specific provisions to the contrary in this act, when
total appropriations are offset by estimated receipts, the State appropriations
shall control, notwithstanding receipts being greater or less than anticipated.

1	(a) In fiscal year 2021, the Governor, with the approval of the General
2	Assembly or the Joint Fiscal Committee if the General Assembly is not in
3	session, may accept federal funds available to the State of Vermont, including
4	block grants in lieu of or in addition to funds herein designated as federal. The
5	Governor, with the approval of the General Assembly or the Joint Fiscal
6	Committee if the General Assembly is not in session, may allocate all or any
7	portion of such federal funds for any purpose consistent with the purposes for
8	which the basic appropriations in this act have been made.
9	(b) If, during fiscal year 2021, federal funds available to the State of
10	Vermont and designated as federal in this and other acts of the 2020 session of
11	the Vermont General Assembly are converted into block grants or are
12	abolished under their current title in federal law and reestablished under a new
13	title in federal law, the Governor may continue to accept such federal funds for
14	any purpose consistent with the purposes for which the federal funds were
15	appropriated. The Governor may spend such funds for such purposes for not
16	more than 45 days prior to Legislative or Joint Fiscal Committee approval.
17	Notice shall be given to the Joint Fiscal Committee without delay if the
18	Governor intends to use the authority granted by this section, and the Joint
19	Fiscal Committee shall meet in an expedited manner to review the Governor's
20	request for approval.
21	Sec. A.107 NEW POSITIONS

1	(a) Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the total number of		
2	authorized State positions, both classified and exempt, excluding temporary		
3	positions as defined in 3 V.S.A. § 311(a)(11), shall not be increased during		
4	fiscal year 2021 except for new positions authorized by the 2020 session.		
5	Limited service positions approved pursuant to 32 V.S.A. § 5 shall not be		
6	subject to this restriction.
