Rep. Fagan of Rutland City for the committee on Appropriations recommended that the bill ought to pass when amended as follows:

In Sec. 28, replacement of Middlesex Secure Residential Recovery facility, in subsection (b), by striking out subdivisions (2) and (3) in their entirety and inserting in lieu thereof the following:

(2) Beginning on August 15, 2019, the Secretary of Human Services shall notify the chairs of the House Committees on Appropriations, on Corrections and Institutions, and on Health Care and the Senate Committees

on Appropriations, on Health and Welfare, and on Institutions at least monthly of updates on the status of the RRMC and RMHS negotiations.

(3) On or before December 15, 2019, the Secretary shall submit a written report on the status of the RRMC and RMHS negotiations to the House Committees on Appropriations, on Corrections and Institutions, and on Health Care and the Senate Committees on Appropriations, on Health and Welfare, and on Institutions. The report shall include an analysis of the current costs to the state of operating secure residential beds as compared to the costs of operating these beds at RRMC and RMHS.

Having appeared on the Calendar one day for notice, was taken up, read the second time, the report of the committee on Appropriations agreed to and third reading ordered.
