- 1. What do you think are the biggest challenges facing Vermonters in poverty today?
 - Low income; insufficient wages
 - Limited opportunity due to disability
 - Job loss
 - Benefits cliff
 - Rents are too high
 - Earning potential is much less than living expenses
 - Mass transit system is lacking, particularly in rural communities
 - Addressing the needs of homeless children, including keeping them in school
 - Lack of childcare options; high cost of child care
 - Limited availability of legal aid
 - Food shelf running out of food
 - Elderly: making their money stretch
 - Lack of communication among service providers
 - Job training
- 2. From your experience and perspective, what works well to help lift Vermonters out of poverty?
 - Good paying jobs
 - Flexible schedule/Comp Time; particularly for parents
 - Previously utilized welfare to work/25% formula
 - Health of family
 - Scattered site leases
 - Housing near school
 - Hardship application process
 - Sick days
 - Increase Reach up; it currently addresses only49.6% of basic needs

- Service providers embedded in community
- Building relationships between Providers and clients
- Human connections
- Understanding safety boundaries
- 3. From your experience and perspective, what does not work well and can be improved?
 - Medicating children without treatment
 - Create/Open day labor for persons in need of employment: Laid off workers, out of jail
 - Teach children job skills
 - One-time housing: Funds cap can be improved
 - Day labor opportunities: flexibility
 - Daycare/school closings due to weather
 - Parent-unfriendly work environment
 - Daycare short and over regulated
 - Services difficult to navigate if complex issues
 - Too much shuffling between agencies Lack of access to low barrier shelters
 - Lack of housing for at risk youth (unaccompanied)
 - Childcare for 2nd/3rd shift
 - Access to Childcare
