Supportive housing for families with complex needs who have experienced homelessness


7 community providers (7 districts) 210 families in SFY 2019

- Winston Prouty Center in Brattleboro
- COTS & Howard Center in Burlington
- Homeless Prevention Center in Rutland
- Upper Valley Haven in Hartford
- NEKCA in St. Johnsbury
- Family Center of Washington County in Barre
- Sunrise Family Resource Center in Bennington

Program Components

- Permanent housing (MOU with housing providers; matching families with FUP vouchers)
- Intensive home-based case management and service coordination – caseloads of 12 to 15 families
- Financial empowerment support (banking, spending, debt/credit, savings)
- Strengthening Families Framework
- Holistic, two-generation approach using nonjudgmental, positive, and trauma-informed communication and engagement

FSH Eligibility & Prioritization

All Families meet the AHS/HUD definition of homelessness


Prioritized - one point for each:

- Families with multiple episodes of homelessness
- Families that are open for services (or have active case) with the Family Services Division of DCF
- Families with at least one child under 6












Length of Homelessness (Months)




Family Housing Stability




Housing and Voucher Status Overview








FSD Data Study Highlights

- Included **305** families served by FSH in FY 17, 18, 19
- 49% (150) of these families had a history of FSD involvement
- **67%** (204) of these families:
 - closed their open case while in FSH and did not have a new one
 - had no new cases while enrolled in FSH
 - had no new cases after exit
- 57% (174) of these families had exited the program. Of these:
 - **72**% (123/174) did not have an open case after exit
