6	(a) A person shall not bring into, transport into, transport within, transport
7	through, or possess in the State any live wild bird or animal of any kind,
8	including any manner of feral swine, without authorization from the
9	Commissioner or his or her designee. The importation permit may be granted
10	under such regulations therefor as the Commissioner shall prescribe and only
11	after the Commissioner has made such investigation and inspection of the birds
12	or animals as she or he may deem necessary. The Department may dispose of
13	unlawfully possessed or imported wildlife as it may judge best, and the State
14	may collect treble damages from the violator of this subsection for all expenses
15	incurred.
16	(b) No person shall bring into the State from another country, state, or
17	province wildlife illegally taken, transported, or possessed contrary to the laws
18	governing the country, state, or province from which the wildlife originated.
19	(c) No person shall place a Vermont-issued tag on wildlife taken outside
20	the State. No person shall report big game in Vermont when the wildlife is
21	taken outside the State.

1	(d) Nothing in this section shall prohibit the Commissioner or duly
2	authorized agents of the Department of Fish and Wildlife from bringing into
3	the State for the purpose of planting, introducing, or stocking or from planting,
4	introducing, or stocking in the State any wild bird or animal.
5	(e) Applicants shall pay a permit fee of \$100.00.
6	(f)(1) The Commissioner shall not issue a permit under this section for the
7	importation or possession of the following live species, a hybrid or genetic
8	variant of the following species, offspring of the following species, or
9	offspring or a hybrid of a genetically engineered variant of the following
10	species: feral swine including wild boar, wild hog, wild swine, fepral pig, feral
11	hog, old world swine, razorback, Eurasian wild boar, or Russian wild boar (Sus
12	scrofo Linnaeus). A feral swine is:
13	(A) a domestic pig that is outside of an enclosure longer than 96
14	hours and is free roaming on public or private land; or
15	(B) an animal that exhibits at least one of the following skeletal
16	characteristics:
17	(i) skull characteristics of an elongated snout or sloping
18	appearance with little or no stop at the eye line;
19	(ii) a shoulder structure with a steep or predominate ridge along
20	the back appearance, known as a razorback;

1	(iii) hindquarters proportionally smaller than the forequarters
2	lacking natural muscling found in commercial species; or
3	(iv) visible tusks.
4	(C) an animal that is genetically determined to be a Eurasian wild boar
5	or Eurasian wild boar-domestic pig hybrid as characterized with appropriate
6	genome-wide molecular tools by USDA Wildlife Services to be a feral swine
7	or feral swine hybrid based on results of genetic testing conducted at the
8	National Wildlife Research Center.
9	(D) This definition does not include feral swine collared and used by
10	state and/or federal wildlife damage management entities, such as the U.S.
11	Department of Agriculture, Wildlife Services, to determine the location of free
12	ranging feral swine.
13	(2) This subsection shall not apply to the domestic pig (Sus domesticus)
14	involved in domestic hog production and shall not restrict or limit the authority
15	of the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets to regulate the importation
16	or possession of the domestic pig as livestock or as a domestic animal under
17	Title 6 of the Vermont Statutes Annotated.
18	(3) Any feral swine may be removed or destroyed by the Department;
19	the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets; or a designee, such as the U.S.
20	Department of Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service,
21	Wildlife Services. The Department shall notify the owner, if possible; the

I	Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets; and the municipality where the
2	feral swine is located, prior to the removal or destruction of the feral swine.
3	(4) The Department shall notify the owner, if possible; the Agency of
4	Agriculture, Food and Markets; and the municipality where the feral swine is
5	located of the disposition of the feral swine.
6	(5) Any person who kills a feral swine in Vermont shall report to a State
7	game warden and shall present the carcass to the State game warden within 24
8	hours for identification and examination., disease sample collection, or case
9	assignment.
10	(6) The State, or its designee pursuant to (f)(1)(C)(3) of this section,
11	shall not be liable for damages or claims associated with the removal or
12	destruction of feral swine provided that the actions of the State agents or
13	designees are reasonable. The removal or destruction of feral swine shall be
14	deemed reasonable where:
15	a. the Department has acted in accordance with Section 3 above;
16	b. the Department determines that the swine:
17	i. is a threat to public safety;
18	ii. has harmed or posed a threat to any person or domestic animal;

15	(2) scientific research governed by accepted procedural standards

2	§ 3350. THE DISPOSITION OF FERAL SWINE
3	(a) The General Assembly finds that feral swine have the potential for
4	spreading disease to domestic livestock, may cause devastating destruction to
5	natural ecosystems, and pose a threat to human health and safety.
6	(b) In light of the potential impacts of feral swine, and notwithstanding the
7	provisions of law in this chapter, the Department of Fish and Wildlife may
8	remove or destroy feral swine in accordance with the requirements of 10
9	<u>V.S.A. § 4709(f)(3).</u>
10	(c) The exercise by the Department of Fish and Wildlife of the authority
11	under 10 V.S.A. § 4709 (f)(3) shall not prevent any person from pursuing or
12	collecting the remedies set forth in this chapter.
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
