Key Points to Make to the House Education Committee Regarding House Bill 661

- Thanks for the time. May Windham colleagues introduce themselves?
- Here to represent Windham's taxpayers; >ingly desperate
- Rejected school budget; would have had highest anticipated school district homestead tax rate in VT (\$2.84)
- 2011-2019 tax rate grew about 1% a year; \$1.585 to \$1.74; Ups and downs; 9.7% over 9 years... Under control...affordable
- After 2019 school budget passed and after school began, several pre-K students arrived who needed special ed services. Totally unanticipated.
- From Fiscal Year 2019 through FY2021 Windham will have paid nearly \$150,000 (\$147,700) in ECSE costs. A very underfunded mandate.
- Windham taxpayers recognize importance of ECSE; no objection to providing services. But we need help in bearing such high costs and H.661, if you pass it, will certainly help us.
- But that's not the whole story
- 2019 to 2020 homestead tax rate up about 32%; from FY2020 to FY2021 up another 23%; from 2019 through 2021 up over 63% if budget passed
- Factors driving up the tax rate
 - 1. ECSE underfunded mandate
 - 2. Other state unfunded mandates (health insurance; \$75K)
 - 3. Windham is a small, rural town with few students and higher educational costs (ex=special ed) 100 2500 32 pm /2 mm /2
- As a result, our per pupil expenditures exceed the excess spending threshold and we have to pay severe excess spending penalties
- FY 21 excess spending penalty is \$115,881; 20% of Windham's tax liability; penalties alone add about 75 cents to homestead tax rate
- Our understanding is that excess spending penalties exist to discourage wealthier towns from engaging in excessive, discretionary spending on their schools.

- Windham's excess spending isn't discretionary; cannot avoid ECSE and other mandates (and we don't even want to), but we do feel Windham is being unfairly punished for obeying the law. (Speed limit analogy?)
- The increase in our homestead tax rate is causing serious hardship for Windham residents.
 - 1. Some residents report a doubling of their taxes over the past four or five years. (Imme)
 - 2. Some say they may have to sell and move.
 - 3. How to attract young families with highest homestead rate?
- Windham Not wealthy town
 - 1. No McMansions
 - 2. 62% retired; fixed income
 - 3. 80% of residents qualify for income sensitivity
- Windham sends over 61% of our education tax dollars to the state and keeps only a little over 38% to educate our children.
- We have cut our school budget to the bone; we need help

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- Passing H661 would give us some relief by increasing the reimbursement we receive for ECSE.
- Legislation that would eliminate excess spending penalties for providing ECSE services also is needed. (Call on Russ for details?)

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
