Why Attainment Matters: Economic Imperative





64%






Why Attainment Matters: Civic Imperative



Education is the most effective way to break the cycle of poverty.







Why Attainment Matters: Equity Imperative



1 in 4 Vermonters do not have access to fixed, high-speed broadband internet, which disproportionately affects those in rural areas.

22 percent of Vermont's indigenous population holds a bachelor's degree, compared to 37 percent of their white peers.





Only **16 percent** of Vermont's Class of 2012 first-generation boys obtained an educational credential within 4 years of high school graduation.

Vermonters in adult and juvenile corrections facilities are *ineligible* for federal financial aid, and still may be upon release.





Why Attainment Matters: Affordability Imperative



Vermont **ranks 49th** in the country for higher education funding per public school student.



Before financial aid, an average Vermont family would spend **95 percent** of its household income to send one person to college.



The average student debt for Vermont bachelor's degree recipients in 2017 was **\$30,651**.

60 percent of Vermont bachelor's degree recipients in 2017 graduated college with student debt.



Only **34 percent** of Vermonters without a postsecondary degree believe degree and credential programs are affordable.





State Goal: 70x2025

"It shall be the goal of the State of Vermont that not less than 70 percent of working age Vermonters will hold a credential of value, as defined by the State Workforce Development Board, by the year 2025" – Act 80 of 2019

Change the Narrative

Build awareness of the importance of postsecondary education and training, and the diversity of education and career pathways.

Advocate

Promote equitable policy and programming that expands access to and the completion of postsecondary education and training for students of all ages and backgrounds.

Convene

Mobilize stakeholders to achieve systems-level change by increasing communication, coordination, and sharing of knowledge and best practices.

Measure

Track progress toward Vermont's postsecondary attainment goal, identify where equity-related gaps exist, and share state- and national-level, data, research, and trends.

Meetings Today's Students Where They Are

Policy

- → Make education and training more affordable
- → Support adult learners and those historically underserved
- → Align education and workforce development efforts
- → Promote student-centered credential delivery and support services





Meetings Today's Students Where They Are

Programming

- → Provide flexible pathways including competency-based learning, off-campus or online offerings and varied course or program timing to fit needs of part-time learners
- Leverage partnerships to fit the demands of a region, industry, community, or population





Meetings Today's Students Where They Are

Student Supports

- → Develop advising models to connect students with supports from institutions, employers, and community/government programs
- → Address basic student needs such as housing, food, child care, emergency expenses, and transportation






Tracking Progress
