#### **Poverty & Homelessness in Vt**

**About 1 in 10 Vermonters living below the poverty level** (11.6%) – that's about 70,000 people.

**Nearly 1 in 3 Vermonters are low income** (29% < 200% FPL) – includes those working, but often not making enough to get by.

On any given night, 1,291 people in Vermont are homeless (in a shelter, motel or unsheltered). Annually,

- Leverage (\$3.5 million → \$54.7 million)

- Individuals and families with low incomes are stable and achieve economic security.
- Communities where people with low incomes live are healthy and offer economic opportunity.
- People with low incomes are engaged and active in building opportunities in communities.

Savings and assets are the building blocks for economic mobility and security

Income helps people get by, Assets help people get ahead

#### **Homeless Assistance Programs**

Help for people in crisis to find or keep stable, safe housing

#### **Housing Opportunity Program:**

- Year-round and seasonal emergency homeless shelters;
- day shelters;
- domestic violence shelters;
- transitional housing for youth & vets;
- homelessness prevention and rapid re-housing programs



Last year 3,872 people were sheltered: 2,770 adults & 1,102 children

#### **Homeless Assistance Programs**

#### **Family Supportive Housing**

- Supportive housing for families with complex needs experiencing homelessness
- 7 community providers, ~120 families currently
- Program components:
  - Permanent housing (MOU with housing providers)
  - Intensive, home-based services (small caseloads)
  - Financial empowerment services (banking, credit, spending, savings)

#### Weatherization

Warmer, safer and more energy efficient homes.

- Energy audit to identify where improvements can be made
- Energy renovation (e.g., insulation, sealing up drafts, improving ventilation)
- **Coaching** on energy saving best practices
- **Referrals** for health & human services
- Heating system upgrades & replacements



## **Our Partners – Our Impact**

- 821 homes weatherized last year
- 400+ faulty heating systems repaired or replaced at no charge
- 6,000+ households received housing help, including more than 1,500 whose homelessness was prevented
- 129+ businesses started and grew, creating 90 FTE jobs
- 3,872 people without housing were sheltered
- 187 families received intensive support to keep their housing
- 50,000+ people received food when they could not afford groceries
- 60 low income Vermonters invested \$129,552 in their first home, business or higher education
- Prepared taxes for 3,000+ households to make sure they receive all credits & refunds due, accessing over \$4 million in refunds
