Dear Commissioner Porter and Honorable Legislators:

I am writing to you today on behalf of our coalition members concerning an incident that happened on January 26th at Dead Creek. I've copied the below social media post from Protect Our Wildlife and I'd like the Commissioner to explain how his Department can support this cruel practice that is not even based in proper wildlife management.

These hounders are terrorizing coyotes in the woods, where we want them and killing coyotes does nothing to reduce coyote populations – your own biologists have gone on record stating that. In addition to the cruelty, people who live in the surrounding area can thank these coyote killers for killing coyotes who were causing no problems for anyone. Now, the remaining pack will disperse and become destabilized, younger pups will start breeding, and without the alphas in charge, may cause problems with humans.

Will any of the legislators on copy here take the initiative, since Vermont Fish & Wildlife will not, and put an end to this abusive practice?

From Protect Our Wildlife:

We were just notified of coyote hounders seen at the eastern side of Dead Creek Wildlife Management Area in Addison county who had no control over their hounds.

A hiker came across the hounds who were outfitted with radio collars. One of the hounders tried numerous times to retrieve the hounds by shouting verbal commands and applying low voltage zaps. When one hound wouldn't comply, the hounder must've shocked the dog at a high

voltage until the dog screamed, leapt ("levitated" is the word used) in the air, and bolted.
These hounders don't just abuse coyotes, their hounds are also often abused.
How much longer will Vermont Fish & Wildlife endorse this legal form of dog fighting?
