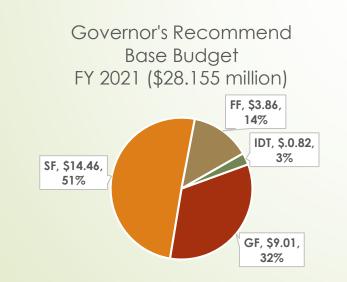

Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets FY 2021 Governor's Recommend Base Budget

FY 2021 SUMMARY & HIGHLIGHTS

MISSION: Facilitate, support and encourage the growth and viability of agriculture while protecting the working landscape, human health, animal health, plant health, consumers and the environment.

VISION: Help develop a safe, secure, ecologically responsive, profitable and fair local foods system for Vermont and Vermont customers which will enable Vermont to be a leader and participant in the global food system. The Agency will do this by assuming a leadership position important to the evolving food system, through access to and the application of resources (human, financial, social and environmental) and by supporting the creation of new opportunities.



- \$181,310 GF increase over FY 2020
 appropriated
- 6 Exempt, 132 Classified positions
- Online licensing & registration launched in October 2019. Received over \$943,184 in credit card/ACH payments between October and December 2019
- PHARM Division excited about explosion of hemp industry
- Water Quality Division continues to interact with farmers on multiple stakeholder groups
- Animal Identification requirements changing at the federal level and expectations of consumers for traceability

Internal service costs such as Fee for Space, insurances, VISION, etc., are allocated throughout the Agency, generally based on number of positions.

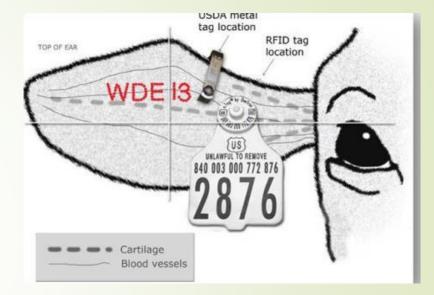

Agricultural Development One-Time Expenditure

- Working Lands Enterprises Initiative General Fund -\$750,000
- Base Budget \$594,000 for grants

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- Due to strong collaboration over the past eight years, across three agencies and due to staff with experience in the private sector, the Initiative is now poised to increase scale of projects, drive innovation, and add both jobs and revenue growth to agriculture and forestry businesses.
 - Working Lands Enterprise Board received 104 Business grant applications, totaling requests of \$4.6 million. 27 opplications were dairy projects for a total ask of \$1.43 million.
- Since 2012, over \$6.1 million dollars invested from Working Lands Enterprise Fund, and over 10 million dollars leveraged – reaching all 14 counties, resulting in over \$27 million in sales revenues and over 500 jobs created.

\$750,000 added one-time from General Funds to continue the excellent Economic Development work in Rural Communities

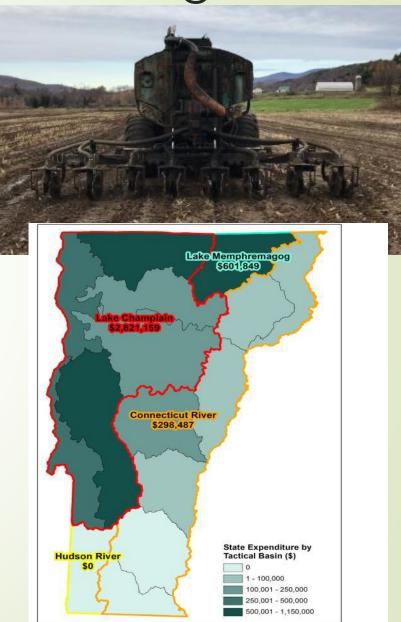

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- Help Vermont fruit and vegetable growers implement on-farm produce safety practices through outreach, education, technical assistance, and financial assistance.
- Ensure compliance with the federal Food Safety Modernization Act (FSMA) Produce Safety Rule by conducting annual inspections for all farms covered by the rule.

 - One-Time Appropriations \$1,190,000.00
 - \$15,000.00-2200891807- Grant to VHCB: Funds are fully obligated through an existing grant agreement.
 - \$75,000.00-2200891902-Grant to VHCB: These dollars were just appropriated in the 2019 Legislative Session and will be granted to VHCB in FY20.
