9	Subject: Agriculture; agricultural development; hemp
10	Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to require the
11	Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets to establish a program to distribute
12	industrial hemp seed for cultivation to persons registered in the State industrial
13	hemp cultivation program. The bill would also make changes to State law to
14	conform to amendments to federal law regarding the cultivation of hemp. In
15	addition, the bill requires the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets to
16	develop education and outreach materials regarding the legal requirements for
17	the cultivation of hemp and sale of hemp products under federal law.
18	An act relating to establishing a hemp seed distribution program
19	It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:
20	Sec. 1. FINDINGS

1	The General Assembly finds that:
2	(1) Dairy farming is vital to the economy, landscape, and culture of
3	Vermont.
4	(2) Dairy farming contributes over \$2 billion to the Vermont economy
5	each year.
6	(3) Dairy farms constitute approximately 15 percent of the State's land
7	and provide the open space that defines the landscape of Vermont.
8	(4) Despite the vital contributions of dairy farming to Vermont, the
9	dairy industry in Vermont is struggling as costs of production far exceed the
10	milk prices that are fixed at artificially low prices under federal milk order.
11	(5) Since 2008, the number of dairy farms in Vermont has declined from
12	approximately 1,100 farms to 750 farms in 2018, and the Agency of
13	Agriculture, Food and Markets predict at least another eight to ten percent of
14	dairy farms will go out of business in the next year.
15	(6) In order to survive, many dairy farms must diversify or transition to
16	other types of farming, including cultivation of hemp.
17	(7) In 2018, the U.S. Congress enacted the Agricultural Improvement
18	Act of 2018, known as the Federal Farm Bill, which included provisions
19	removing hemp from the federal list of controlled substances and authorizing
20	the cultivation of hemp and the sale of hemp products under a State registered

1	program or, where no state program existed a U.S. Department of Agriculture
2	program.
3	(8) According to the Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food and
4	Markets, the cultivation of hemp could be a "game changer" for Vermont
5	farming that could provide farmers new, additional sources of income to offset
6	the impacts of low milk prices.
7	(9) To support farming in Vermont and foster the cultivation of hemp on
8	Vermont dairy farms, the State should establish a program for the
9	dissemination of hemp seed to farmers registering with the Agency of
10	Agriculture, Food and Markets.
11	Sec. 2. 6 V.S.A. § 564 is amended to read:
12	§ 564. REGISTRATION; ADMINISTRATION; PILOT PROJECT
13	(a) The Secretary shall establish a pilot program to research regulate the
14	growth, cultivation, and marketing of industrial hemp. Under the pilot
15	program, the Secretary shall register persons who will participate in the pilot
16	program through growing or cultivating industrial hemp. The Secretary shall
17	certify the site where industrial hemp will be cultivated by each person
18	registered under this chapter. A person who intends to participate in the pilot
19	program and grow industrial hemp <u>annually</u> shall register with the Secretary
20	and submit on a form provided by the Secretary the following:
21	(1) the name and address of the person;

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(2) a statement that the seeds obtained for planting are of a type and
variety that do not exceed the maximum concentration of tetrahydrocannabinol
set forth in subdivision 562(3) of this title; and
(3) the location and acreage of all parcels sown and other field reference
information as may be required by the Secretary.
(b) The form provided by the Secretary pursuant to subsection (a) of this
section shall include a notice statement that:
(1) cultivation and possession of industrial hemp in Vermont is a
violation of the federal Controlled Substances Act law unless the industrial
hemp is grown, cultivated, or marketed under a pilot program authorized by
section 7606 of the federal Agricultural Act of 2014, Pub. L. No. 113-79;
section 10113 of the Agriculture Improvement Act of 2018. Pub. L. No. 115-
<u>334; and</u>
(2) federal prosecution for growing hemp in violation of federal law
may include criminal penalties, forfeiture of property, and loss of access to
federal agricultural benefits, including agricultural loans, conservation
programs, and insurance programs ; and
(3) registrants may purchase or import hemp genetics from any state that
complies with federal requirements for the cultivation of industrial hemp.
(c) A person registered with the Secretary pursuant to this section shall
allow industrial hemp crops, throughout sowing, growing season, harvest,

1	storage, and processing, to be inspected and tested by and at the discretion of
2	the Secretary or designee. The Secretary shall retain tests and inspection
3	information collected under this section for the purposes of research of the
4	growth and cultivation of industrial hemp.
5	(d) The Secretary may assess an annual registration fee of \$25.00 for the
6	performance of his or her duties under this chapter.
7	Sec. 3. 6 V.S.A. § 566 is amended to read:
8	§ 566. RULEMAKING AUTHORITY
9	(a) The Secretary may adopt rules to provide for the implementation of this
10	chapter and the pilot project program authorized under this chapter, which may
11	include rules to require hemp to be tested during growth for
12	tetrahydrocannabinol levels and to require inspection and supervision of hemp
13	during sowing, growing season, harvest, storage, and processing. The
14	Secretary shall not adopt under this or any other section a rule that would
15	prohibit a person to grow hemp based on the legal status of hemp under federal
16	law.
17	(b) The Secretary shall adopt rules establishing how the Agency of
18	Agriculture, Food and Markets will conduct research within the pilot program
19	for industrial hemp.
20	(c) The Secretary shall adopt rules establishing requirements for the
21	registration of processors of hemp and hemp-infused products.

2 § 569. HEMP SEED DISTRIBUTION PROGRAM

- 3 The Secretary shall establish a program to distribute industrial hemp seed
- 4 <u>for cultivation to each person registered under section 564 of this title. The</u>
- 5 <u>Secretary shall distribute hemp seed under this section free of charge. The</u>
- 6 <u>Secretary shall provide 25 pounds of hemp seed per acre of land identified in</u>
- 7 <u>the registration application for cultivation.</u>
- 8 Sec. 5. EDUCATION AND OUTREACH
- 9 The Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets, after consultation with the
- 10 Attorney General and the Commissioner of Public Safety, shall develop
- 11 education and outreach materials regarding the legal requirements for the
- 12 cultivation of hemp and sale of hemp products under 10113 of the Agriculture
- 13 Improvement Act of 2018. Pub. L. No. 115-334. The education and outreach
- 14 <u>material shall include:</u>
- 15 (1) a summary of the requirements for application and participation in
- 16 the industrial hemp program established under 6 V.S.A. chapter 34;
