Thank you for this time to testify.

I provided more detailed testimony to **Rep Partridge**; but would like to provide some perspective and then make myself available for any questions you might have.

- \*Stowe has been a leader in environmental conservation. More than a third of Stowe's 72 square miles is conserved and we have more locally designated scenic roads than the rest of the Vermont combined. We understand the role trees play both aesthetically and environmentally.
- \*Tree Wardens authority should remain with shade and ornamental trees. The legislative body should otherwise be in control of the highways in accordance with Title 19 (Highway Statutes).
- \*Towns need to be able to act in **emergencies** without having to obtain the approval of tree wardens for hazard trees. Time is of the essence in protecting life and property.
- \*Towns need be able to maintain brush and power lines within the highway right-of-way without approval of the tree warden unless there it involves a shade or ornamental tree.
- \*Stowe has 95 miles of municipal roads. If you take in consideration both sides of these roads it equals 190 miles of roads and thousands of trees. The Town Road Crew and Electric Departments are out maintaining roads and power lines on a daily basis. In a storm we can be cutting down over 100 trees to restore access and power.

  Mountain towns like Stowe are also disproportionately impacted by the Municipal Road General Permit due to our steep slopes. We are going to need to have to improve ditches to reduce sediment runoff, which may involve out of necessity the taking of trees within the highway right-of-way. The Conservation Commission and Tree Warden have also recommended we proactively remove ash trees within the

Ash Borer. Allowing property owners the right to preserve <u>non</u>-shade and ornamental ash trees within the public right-of-way may be time consuming. For some towns they may choose to involve tree wardens more heavily at their discretion, but for others it is not practical to involve them beyond shade and ornamental trees. Passage of this bill as is may cause the Town of Stowe to move beyond our qualified volunteer tree warden that we often receive sage advice from to necessitating us to imbed the position within our municipal staff both from a demand standpoint and to ensure the Town is in a position to protect in a timely manner the public health, safety and welfare.
