3 Subject: Agriculture; pandemic response; financial assistance

4 Statement of purpose of bill as introduced: This bill proposes to establish

5 within the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets a Dairy Farmer

6 Assistance Program (Program) to provide financial assistance to milk

7 producers and dairy processors that have suffered economic harm caused by

8 the COVID-19 public health emergency.

9 An act relating to financial assistance to milk producers and dairy
10 processors due to the COVID-19 public health emergency

11 It is hereby enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Vermont:

12 Sec. 1. DAIRY ASSISTANCE; CORONAVIRUS RELIEF FUND;

13 APPROPRIATION

14 The sum of \$50,000,000.00 is appropriated from the Coronavirus Relief
15 Fund to the Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets in fiscal year 2021 to
16 implement the Dairy Assistance Program established under Sec. 2 of this act at
17 the maximum payment amounts set under the Program for milk producers and
18 dairy processors. If the appropriation to the Dairy Assistance Program is
19 reduced prior to enactment, the maximum payment amounts for milk producers

1 and dairy processors shall be reduced by the same percentage as the reduction
2 of the total appropriation to the Program.

3 Sec. 2. DAIRY ASSISTANCE PROGRAM; PURPOSE; ESTABLISHMENT

4 (a) Findings. The General Assembly finds that:

5 (1) Dairy farming has significant economic, ecological, and cultural
6 impact on the State of Vermont, as evidenced by the fact that:

7 (A) 65 to 70 percent of gross farm income in Vermont is derived
8 from dairy farming;

9 (B) Milk from dairy farms accounts for 65 percent of agricultural
10 product sales in Vermont;

11 (C) Vermont's cow dairy farms account for 65 percent of the
12 agricultural product sales in Vermont;

13 (D) Vermont produces two-thirds of the milk sold in New England;

14 (E) The Vermont dairy industry generates \$2.2 billion in economic
15 activity in the State;

16 (F) 72,000 Vermonters are employed in the farm and forest sector,
17 which is 28 percent of Vermont's private sector jobs;

18 (G) 80 percent of all open land in Vermont is managed by dairy
19 farmers; and

1 (H) The open land created by dairy farmers is integral to the rural life
2 Vermonters enjoy and to the scenic beauty that is the base of the State tourism
3 industry.

4 (2) Vermont’s dairy sector, across all scales and production methods,
5 has been negatively impacted for over five years as:

6 (A) the price farmers have been paid for milk has been set under a
7 federal milk market order that has been generating artificially low prices due to
8 global market forces and commodity manipulation; and

9 (B) costs of of milk production have far exceeded the price paid for
10 milk.

11 (3) The U.S. Department of Agriculture and several agricultural policy
12 institutions across the United States predicted that the prolonged downturn in
13 dairy pricing would begin to end in February and March of 2020 with the
14 estimated all milk price expected to rise to \$19.00 to \$20.00 a hundredweight.

15 (4) As a result of the predicted increase in milk prices, many farmers did
16 not enroll in federal price protection programs and also took on fianciang in
17 anticipation of increased prices.

18 (5) The predicted increase in milk prices never materialized as the
19 COVID-19 public health emergency and the public health precautions it
20 required resulted in the dairy industry losing two of its three major end markets
21 in restaurants and institutions, driving milk prices from the estimated \$19.00 to

1 \$20.00 per hundredweight to prices as low as \$10.00 to \$13.00 per
2 hundredweight after cooperative fees and other assessments.

3 (6) The losses Vermont dairy farms incurred were immediate and
4 debilitating, as farms struggled to pay feed, seed, labor, and other costs of
5 production.

6 (7) Many dairy farms are at a threshold of survival, and it is possible
7 that many more farms will join the 17 dairy farms that have shuttered since the
8 declaration of the COVID-19 public health emergency;

9 (8) The federal CARES Act appropriated \$1.25 billion of funds to
10 Vermont to address costs and expenses resulting from the COVID-19 public
11 health emergency, including the costs of business interruption and lost markets
12 such as those that dairy farming is suffering under.

13 (9) After detailed data collection and analysis by the Agency of
14 Agriculture, Food and Markets, Governor Scott proposed \$50,000,000.00 of
15 financial assistance to the dairy industry, an amount that would not cover all
16 costs or expenses incurred by dairy farmers due to the COVID-19 public health
17 emergency, but would contribute enough to help farmers cover costs of feed,
18 seed, labor, and equipment during the season of greatest expense to farmers.

19 (10) However, the amount of assistance to dairy farmers has been
20 proposed to be reduced from \$50,000,000.00 to \$20,000,000.00, or five

1 percent of the total amount of the \$400,000,000.00 of CARES Act funds
2 available for economic stimulus.

3 (b) The purpose of this act is for the the General Assembly to strive to
4 appropriate as close to \$50,000,000.00 in CARES Act funds as possible to
5 dairy farming assistance in order to:

6 (A) provide dairy farming with an appropriate level of appropriations
7 necessary to respond to declining prices, lost markets, and costs and expenses
8 caused by the COVID-19 public health emergency;

9 (B) provide the dairy industry with support proportionate to its
10 impact on the Vermont economy;

11 (C) allow for an economic multiplier effect across the rural economy
12 as farms will use appropriated funds immediately to pay pending costs and
13 expenses such as feed, seed, labor, and fuel; and

14 (D) continue to support and give back to the core of the working
15 lands economy and culture of Vermont at a time of its greatest need.

16 (c) Definitions. As used in this section:

17 (1) “Animal feeding operation” (AFO) means a lot or facility where
18 livestock have been, are, or will be stabled or confined and fed or maintained
19 for a total of 45 days or more in any 12-month period and crops, vegetation, or
20 forage growth are not sustained in the normal growing season over any portion
21 of the lot or facility. Two or more individual farms qualifying as an AFO that

1 are under common ownership and that adjoin each other or use a common area
2 or system for the disposal of waste shall be considered to be a single AFO if
3 the combined number of resulting livestock qualifies as a medium farm as
4 defined in subdivision (7) of this subsection.

5 (2) “Certified small farm” means a small farm with at least 50 mature
6 dairy cows required to certify compliance with the Required Agricultural
7 Practices under 6 V.S.A. § 4871 and so certified as of March 1, 2020.

8 (3) “Dairy processor” means a person, partnership, unincorporated
9 association, or corporation that owns or controls any place, premises, or
10 establishment where butter, cheese, cream, buttermilk, infant formula, ice
11 cream, yogurt, or other dairy products identified by rule by the Secretary are
12 processed for sale.

13 (4) “Economic harm” means a milk producer’s or a dairy processor’s
14 expenses or lost revenue, or both, related to the 2020 COVID-19 public health
15 emergency.

16 (5) “Goat or sheep dairy farm” means any place or premises where one
17 or more dairy goats or dairy sheep, or both, are kept and where a part or all of
18 the milk from the animals is sold or offered for sale.

19 (6) “Large farm” means an AFO that houses 700 or more mature dairy
20 animals and where a part or all of the milk from the dairy animals is sold or
21 offered for sale.

1 (7) “Medium farm” is an AFO that houses 200 to 699 mature dairy
2 animals and where a part or all of the milk from the dairy animals is sold or
3 offered for sale.

4 (8) “Milk producer” or “producer” is a person, partnership,
5 unincorporated association, or corporation that owns or controls one or more
6 dairy cows, dairy goats, or dairy sheep and sells or offers for sale a part or all
7 of the milk produced by the animals.

8 (9) “Secretary” means the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets
9 or designee.

10 (10) “Small farm” means:

11 (A) an AFO that houses not more than 199 mature dairy cows; or

12 (B) a goat or sheep dairy farm where a part or all of the milk from the
13 animals is sold or offered for sale.

14 (d) Program establishment; eligibility.

15 (1) There is established within the Agency of Agriculture, Food and
16 Markets a Dairy Farmer Assistance Program (Program) to provide financial
17 assistance to milk producers and dairy processors that have suffered economic
18 harm in Vermont caused by the COVID-19 public health emergency.

19 (2) In order to qualify for assistance under this section, a milk producer
20 or dairy processor shall:

21 (A) be currently producing milk or dairy products; and

1 (B) accurately demonstrate to the Secretary economic harm that
2 occurred or accrued on or after March 1, 2020 and before December 1, 2020
3 by providing evidence of losses related to the costs of business disruption
4 caused by the COVID-19 public health emergency.

5 (3) A milk producer may elect to have its economic harm determined by
6 calculating the difference between what the producer was paid for milk
7 produced between March 1, 2020 and December 1, 2020 and the price that the
8 producer would have been paid if the price for milk remained at the statistical
9 uniform price of \$18.13 cwt for the Middlebury location in January of 2020, or
10 the milk producer may enter its own verifiable average price for March
11 through December 2020 and calculate the difference to its own verifiable
12 average price for January 2020 as well as added costs or expenses related to
13 the COVID-19 public health emergency.

14 (4) Economic harm is not compensable under this section if the same
15 economic harm has been or will be covered by insurance or another State or
16 federal grant.

17 (e) Administration; implementation.

18 (1) The Program shall be administered by the Agency of Agriculture,
19 Food and Markets, which shall award available funds to eligible applicants that
20 demonstrate economic harm.

1 (2) The Secretary shall create an application form that milk producers
2 and dairy processors shall utilize when applying for relief. Applicants shall
3 certify that all information they provide is truthful and accurate to the best of
4 their knowledge, information, and belief.

5 (3) The Secretary shall, based on the amount of economic harm incurred
6 by the milk producer or dairy processor on the date the application is received,
7 provide awards up to the maximum disbursement permitted for each type of
8 qualified farm or for each qualified dairy processor. Applications shall be
9 processed in the order received, but an application shall not be ready for
10 evaluation until the Secretary determines that the application is
11 administratively complete and includes all required proof of economic harm.

12 (f) Payment; maximum award.

13 (1) Until all funds appropriated to the Program for milk producers are
14 awarded, the Secretary shall award payments to reimburse qualified milk
15 producers for demonstrated economic harm as follows:

16 (A) Small farms shall receive up to \$42,500.00.

17 (B) Certified small farms shall receive up to \$60,000.00.

18 (C) Medium farms shall receive up to \$90,000.00.

19 (D) Large farms shall receive up to \$110,000.00.

20 (2) Until all funds appropriated to the Program for dairy processors are
21 awarded, the Secretary shall award payments to reimburse qualified dairy

1 processors for demonstrated economic harm as follows:

2 (A) Dairy processors that process less than 500 pounds of milk per
3 day shall receive up to \$56,500.00.

4 (B) Dairy processors that process from 500 to 9,999 pounds of milk
5 per day shall receive up to \$70,000.00.

6 (C) Dairy processors that process from 10,000 to 49,999 pounds of
7 milk per day shall receive up to \$97,000.00.

8 (D) Dairy processors that process from 50,000 to 99,999 pounds of
9 milk per day shall receive up to \$127,000.00.

10 (E) Dairy processors that process from 100,000 to 499,999 pounds of
11 milk per day shall receive up to \$157,000.00.

12 (F) Dairy processors that process 500,000 pounds or more of milk per
13 day shall receive up to \$185,000.00.

14 (3) To determine maximum grant eligibility, each milk producer shall be
15 evaluated within the farm type known to the Secretary as of March 1, 2020,
16 and each dairy processor shall be evaluated within the milk processing size
17 known to the Secretary as of March 1, 2020.

18 (g) Application; processing.

19 (1) Once a milk producer or dairy processor submits a complete
20 application and demonstrates economic harm, the Secretary shall promptly
21 issue a payment, provided that the appropriated funds have not been expended.

1 The last payment may be a partial payment consisting of the remaining
2 available funds.

3 (2) Whenever a milk producer or dairy processor has not demonstrated
4 economic harm equal to or greater than the maximum allowed disbursement
5 for its category, the application shall remain pending for a potential future
6 showing of additional economic harm. Qualified milk producers or dairy
7 producers that incur additional economic harm after the date of their initial
8 application may file with the Secretary an addendum to demonstrate
9 subsequent economic harm. The Secretary shall create an addendum form that
10 milk producers or dairy processors shall utilize when applying for additional
11 relief. Milk producers and dairy processors shall certify that all information
12 they provide is truthful and accurate to the best of their knowledge,
13 information, and belief. Eligible milk producers or dairy processors may
14 submit an addendum to their initial application on or before October 1, 2020 to
15 show any additional economic harm eligible for compensatory payment. No
16 milk producer or dairy processor shall receive total payments that exceed the
17 maximum allowed payment.

18 (3) All initial applications shall be processed before considering
19 addenda demonstrating additional economic harm, and each addendum shall be
20 processed in the order received. An addendum shall not be ready for
21 evaluation until the Secretary receives all required proof of economic harm and

1 deems the application administratively complete. Once an eligible milk
2 producer or dairy processor submits a complete addendum and demonstrates
3 additional economic harm, the Secretary shall promptly issue a payment,
4 provided the appropriated funds have not been expended. The last payment
5 may be a partial payment consisting of the remaining available funds.

6 (4) Each assistance payment shall be a direct payment from the State of
7 Vermont to an eligible milk producer or dairy processor. A milk producer or
8 dairy processor shall not submit more than one application. Milk producers or
9 dairy processors shall not submit more than one application, provided that a
10 person who is both a milk producer and a dairy processor may submit one
11 application as a milk producer and one as a dairy processor when each business
12 is organized as a separate business entity. A person that is both a milk
13 producer and a dairy processor but is not organized as separate business
14 entities shall submit one application for assistance under this section, but will
15 be eligible for assistance as a milk producer and a dairy processor, provided
16 that the total assistance awarded under this section shall not exceed the total
17 economic harm incurred by the applicant. A milk producer or dairy processor
18 that does not initially qualify for the maximum allowed payment may submit
19 an addendum to demonstrate additional economic harm not later than October
20 1, 2020.

21 (h) Program terms and limitations.

1 (1) The Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets shall issue grant
2 payments under this section on a first-come, first-served basis until all funds
3 are expended or December 20, 2020, whichever is sooner.

4 (2)(A) Except as provided for under subdivision (2)(B) of this
5 subsection, the Attorney General is authorized to recover funds awarded under
6 this section due to fraud, error, crime, or violation of this section, and the
7 Attorney General or the Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets may seek
8 appropriate criminal or civil penalties as authorized by law.

9 (B) In the event the U.S. Department of the Treasury determines that
10 an expenditure of funds made available from the CARES Act, P.L. 116-136,
11 was not necessary or otherwise impermissible under the CARES Act, the
12 Attorney General and the Secretary Agency shall hold harmless any grant
13 recipient that accepted grant funds in good faith reliance on the State
14 concerning the milk producer or dairy processor’s eligibility for, or use of, the
15 grant award.

16 (3) The name of a milk producer or dairy processor that receives an
17 award under this section and the amount of the award are public records
18 subject to inspection and copying under the Public Records Act.

19 (4) Any application documents of a milk producer or dairy processor
20 containing federal identification numbers and sales amounts are subject to the

1 confidentiality provisions of 32 V.S.A. § 3102 and are return information
2 under that section.

3 (5) Data submitted to the Secretary by a milk producer or dairy
4 processor under this section to demonstrate economic harm shall be a trade
5 secret exempt from public inspection and copying under 1 V.S.A. § 317(c)(9),
6 provided that the Secretary may use and disclose submitted information in
7 summary or aggregated form that does not directly or indirectly identify an
8 individual milk producer or dairy processor.

9 Sec. 3. REPORT

10 The Secretary of Agriculture, Food and Markets, beginning on July 1, 2020
11 and ending on January 1, 2021, shall report to the Senate Committees on
12 Agriculture and on Appropriations and the House Committees on Agriculture
13 and Forestry and on Appropriations on the first day of each month regarding
14 the status of the Dairy Assistance Programs established under Sec. 1 of this act.

15 The report shall include:

16 (1) the number of applicants for assistance in each month and overall;
17 and

18 (2) the amount of grant funds awarded under the program.

19 Sec. 4. EFFECTIVE DATE

20 This act shall take effect on passage.
