Re: FY2020 State Budget and older Vermonters

All Vermonters need the same things: food, shelter, community and the ability to receive care. When we have adequate systems of support for older Vermonters, we will improve the lives of all Vermonters.

Most Vermonters want to be able to stay in their homes as we get older. When Vermonters can age in a setting of our choice, we experience better health outcomes, stronger communities, and significant savings compared to costly nursing home care.

 We ask the legislature to cover the cost of home delivered meals for Choices for Care participants as described in H.187. This is approximately \$200k - \$300k from the general fund.

The reimbursement rate to the meal sites and programs is significantly lower than the actual costs to prepare and deliver a meal to older Vermonters.

- We ask the legislature for a 15% increase in the Area Agencies on Aging base general fund appropriation to increase reimbursements to meal providers across the state. This equates to approximately \$650k from the general fund. This request for a 15% increase will help ensure that older Vermonters can live in their homes, have the food that they need, will not go hungry or be malnourished, and, will get a safety check from a friendly volunteer on a regular basis.
- We ask the legislature to help older Vermonters choose where and how they live by providing reasonable and guaranteed annual rate increases for home and community-based providers on par with nursing homes as described in H.189.
