What are "Retention" and "Graduation Rates" What do those figures *miss?*

Retention: For 4-year institutions, the percentage of first-time, full-time bachelor's degree-seeking students from the previous fall term who enroll again in the most recent fall term.

Graduation rates: The percentage of first-time, full-time students who graduate within 150% of the time that is normally required for the program they are in.

These do not measure:

- The number of students who transfer.
- Success of students who take longer than 150% of time to graduation.
- Part-time student success.
- Non-enrolled student success.







Castleton University: 2018 IPEDS



Retention and Graduation: NVU-Lyndon






Retention and Graduation: NVU-Johnson















VSCS Retention and Completion Initiatives:

- 1. Board Priority: "Improve the retention and graduation rates at our colleges."
- 2. <u>Systemwide "Start to Finish"</u> project: data driven initiatives focusing academic, advising and IT resources on retention.
 - Relevant and relational advising strategies
 - Early warning systems and supports
 - Curriculum streamlining and degree maps
- 3. New IT investments to support student success: Learning Management System and Advising Software
- 4. Consistent messaging about persistence.
- 5. Many campus-level efforts, like NVU-Johnson's \$1.8 million federal grant to improve retention and graduation rates, focused on first-year retention.
