11	(7) Vermont Center for Crime Victim Services: \$502,500 is
12	appropriated to Center for Crime Victim Services for costs incurred or
13	anticipated to be incurred in response to the pandemic.
14	(8) Judiciary: \$2,608,500 is appropriated to the Judiciary for costs
15	incurred in response to the pandemic.
16	(9) Agency of Human Services: \$150,000 is appropriated to the Agency
17	of Human Services to be granted to Vermont Legal Aid for increased costs of
18	providing access to justice services in response to the pandemic.
19	(10) Auditor: \$100,000 is appropriated to the State Auditor for the costs
20	to be incurred in response to COVID-19 funding. The Auditor is authorized to
21	fill two vacant positions.

3	digital access for Vermont-based businesses to at least four State agencies.

2	Sec. B.1. FISCAL YEAR 2021 PAY ACT APPROPRIATIONS
3	(a) Executive Branch. The two-year agreements between the State of
4	Vermont and the Vermont State Employees' Association for the Defender
5	General, nonmanagement, supervisory, corrections, and State's Attorneys'
6	offices bargaining units for the period of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2022;
7	the collective bargaining agreement with the Vermont Troopers' Association
8	for the period of July 1, 2020 through June 30, 2022; and salary increases for
9	employees in the Executive Branch not covered by the bargaining agreements
10	shall be funded. In fiscal year 2021, the following is appropriated to the
11	Secretary of Administration:
12	(1) General Fund: \$11,731,745.
13	(2) Transportation Fund: \$4,128,000.
14	(3) Other funds: The Administration shall provide additional spending
15	authority to departments through the existing process of excess receipts to fund
16	the fiscal year 2021 collective bargaining agreements. The estimated amounts
17	are \$ 14,017,000 from special fund, federal, and other sources.
