RE: Creation of the Vermont Coworking Fund

Dear Representatives Marcotte and O'Sullivan:

My name is Evan Carlson, Entrepreneur-in-Residence at Do North Coworking in Lyndonville, and I am writing on behalf of coworking spaces throughout Vermont, 17 of which signed below (there are currently a total of 32). Over the past year, we have formed a collaborative network which meets quarterly and actively shares updates, advice, challenges and success stories and even members. Many of our spaces have been partnering with other organizations (e.g. Center for Women & Enterprise, LaunchVT, Vermont Center for Emerging Technologies (VCET)) to bring business development and support programming to Vermonters throughout the state.

Together, we would like to propose the creation of a fund to support coworking spaces and innovation centers that facilitate the growing remote workforce and scaling businesses in rural Vermont.

We know people are moving to rural Vermont for the lifestyle, not the jobs, but without some core elements in place that move can be difficult. The ThinkVT initiative is hinged on the belief that attracting a more youthful population to the state, who work remotely, will lead to a larger tax base and a more resilient rural economy. To repopulate rural areas, we need to provide broadband access, vibrant village centers and a community to plug in to. Most hub towns struggle to provide this today, but coworking spaces are helping. Our spaces are multi-faceted facilities that provide:

- Soft landings A built-in community of workers to connect with
- High speed internet Business level speeds not accessible outside the village centers
- Entrepreneurial support On-ramp for entrepreneurs to connect with business resources
- Collaboration Natural opportunities for networking and building a sense of community

Every space in Vermont has a slightly different business model and funding strategy, with many relying on grants, donations, sponsorship or just bootstrapping. I am fortunate enough to have my role at Do North Coworking grant funded through 2021, though few other spaces in the state have paid staff and many are operated by volunteers working other full-time jobs.

While there is proof that rural coworking space can sustain themselves, the initial space fit up paired with operating expense can make the business model challenging. For instance, at Do

North Coworking, our 100mbps Spectrum internet service with a 30% discount is \$640/m, while in Burlington the same service can be purchased for \$55/m from Burlington Telecom. Next to staffing and rent, internet service is our highest expense which is a necessity for remote working.

For some spaces broadband is the major expense, for others it is entrepreneurship programming, fit up or initial operating capital. Most of our spaces are still in their infancy, but many have already made a sizable impact on our community; please see the Do North Coworking & Vermont Center for Emerging Technologies 2019 Impact Report.

Other states in our region have developed state funds to support coworking and anecdotally it has made a positive impact. What other programs exist?

- Massachusetts Transformative Development Initiative/MassDev
 - Seed grant up to \$25,000
 - Fit up grants up to \$250,000 for new space builds
- Maine Coworking Development Fund
 - Grants up to \$20,000 per space, per year supports operations & programming

We hope that the House Committee on Commerce and Economic Development will further explore the development of a similar coworking fund in Vermont. When appropriate, the representatives from each of the coworking spaces signed below would welcome the opportunity to offer testimony to this committee.
