15	the Council of State Governments (CSG), the Department of Corrections
16	(DOC), and a survey of community-based organizations. If warranted, the
17	Workgroup may also determine staff requirements, staff training, space needs,
18	potential design, and rough costs of the facility and related programming.
19	(b) Membership. The Workgroup shall be composed of the following four
20	members:
21	(1) the Commissioner of Corrections or designee;

1	(2) the Commissioner of Buildings and General Services or designee;
2	(3) a member of the House Committee on Corrections and Institutions;
3	<u>and</u>
4	(4) a member of the Senate Committee on the Judiciary.
5	(c) Duties.
6	(1) The Workgroup shall have the following duties:
7	(A) secure a consultant to develop and implement a survey of
8	Vermont community-based organizations that provide services and
9	programming provided to women within the criminal justice system to
10	determine the number and programming requirements needed by women likely
11	to recidivate to a correctional facility;
12	(B) secure testimony from community-based organizations that
13	currently provide services to nonincarcerated women under the supervision of
14	the Department of Corrections to determine their ability to provide necessary
15	services and what needs, if any, are required to fulfill the needs of women
16	transitioning from incarceration into the community;
17	(C) determine the number and nature of currently incarcerated
18	women who will benefit from the programming and therapeutic environment
19	of a least restrictive facility that enables them to work in the community or
20	continue educational progress while under the direct supervision of DOC
21	personnel;

1	(D) use the information provided in subdivisions (1) and (2) to
2	determine the bed count needed for a women's reentry facility that will provide
3	the services and programming that enables them to transition to community-
4	based organizations;
5	(2) if the Workgroup determines that information obtained by
6	subdivision (1) of this subsection warrants further investigation, the
7	Workgroup shall:
8	(A) use the information provided by subdivisions (1)(A) and (B) of
9	this subsection to determine the type of programming and services needed by
10	women transitioning from incarceration to community base organizations;
11	(B) receive testimony on gender-informed, trauma aware best-
12	practices in the management and treatment of justice involved women and
13	make recommendations, if any, regarding the training of the Corrections
14	Officers that will work within a women's reentry facility;
15	(C) if warranted, research current design concepts for correctional
16	facilities that serve the supervisory and programmatic needs identified by the
17	Workgroup; and
18	(D) secure the services of a consultant to generate high-level concept
19	designs of a facility that accommodates the needs identified by the efforts of
20	the Workgroup.

1	(d) Assistance. The Workgroup shall have the assistance of the Joint
2	Fiscal Office and the Office of Legislative Council.
3	(e) Report. On or before October 15, 2020, the Workgroup shall
4	provide a final report to the Joint Legislative Justice Oversight Committee, the
5	House Committee on Corrections and Institutions, and the Senate Committee
6	on Institutions describing the Workgroup's work, presenting any high-level
7	concept drawing, and making recommendations, if any, regarding next steps
8	toward the construction of a women's reentry facility, its supporting
9	programming and the training necessary to ensure its success in transitioning
10	women from Vermont correctional facility for women to community-based
11	organizations.
12	(f) Meetings. Beginning on June 1, 2020, the Workgroup may meet every
13	two weeks, as needed until the final report is presented on October 15, 2020.

16	(a) For the amount appropriated in subdivision (c)(4) of Sec. 3, the
17	Brattleboro Retreat must comply with the following provisions:
18	(1) The Retreat shall deliver to the Agency of Human Services monthly
19	reports covering financial performance upon passage of this bill. All financial
20	reports shall be delivered by the end of the month for the previous month's
21	fiscal performance period. Financial reports shall include the following:

1	(A) income statement, with narrative;
2	(B) balance sheet, with narrative;
3	(C) cash flow statement, with narrative;
4	(D) accounts payable update and summary, with narrative;
5	(E) accounts receivable update and summary, with narrative, and
6	(F) copy of the standard monthly financial package that is provided
7	to the Finance Committee of the Board of Trustees.
8	(2) The Retreat shall follow best practices outlined in the March 2020
9	Best Practices Memorandum and ensure compliance with Medicaid billing
10	practices and provider enrollment.
11	(3) The Retreat shall keep the Agency advised of any event or
12	occurrence that materially impacts its financial stability, performance, staffing
13	service delivery capacity, or viability.
14	(4) The Retreat shall provide information to the Department of Mental
15	Health necessary for its statutory oversight responsibilities.
16	(5) The Retreat shall work with the Department of Mental Health to
17	develop an initial strategic plan for the long-term reuse of the renovated
18	facilities to meet future system of care needs.
19	(6) The Retreat shall provide access to the additional 12 level-1 beds to
20	the State for a period determined by the Secretary of Human Services to be in
21	the best interests of the State.

1	(7) The Retreat shall adhere to the terms and conditions of the contract
2	of the operation of the 12 new level-1 beds with the Department of Mental
3	Health.
4	(b) The Brattleboro Retreat, the Agency of Human Services, and the
5	Department of Buildings and General Services shall provide a report at the
6	July and September Joint Fiscal Committee meetings that includes the
7	following information:
8	(1) the Retreat financial reports, including income statement, balance
9	sheet, and cash flow projections;
10	(2) the status of the 12 new Level 1 beds, including anticipated opening
11	date and cost estimates to complete;
12	(3) an update on the development of a long-term strategic plan that
13	analyzes current and future needs of the service delivery priorities and role of
14	the Retreat in Vermont's mental health system of care; and
15	(4) an update on the strategic plan for the long-term reuse of the
16	renovated facility to meet future system of care needs

20	(a) Engineering planning advance. A municipality or a combination of two
21	or more municipalities desiring an advance of funds for engineering and

1	planning for public water supply systems, as defined in subdivision 4752(9) of
2	this title, or improvements, or for clean water projects or improvements, may
3	apply to the Department for an advance under this chapter. Not more than 25
4	percent of funds awarded to a municipality as a planning advance may be
5	utilized to evaluate land use implications of facilities, including impacts on
6	State Planning Goals, outlined in section 4302 of this title, availability of
7	housing, and economic development. As used in this subsection, "engineering
8	planning" may include source exploration, surveys, reports, designs, plans,
9	specifications, or other engineering services necessary in preparation for
10	construction of the types of systems or facilities referred to in this section.
11	(b) Regional engineering planning. The Department, with the approval of
12	the Secretary, may use up to ten percent of the total capital appropriation for
13	construction grants to undertake regional engineering planning and process
14	research. Funds approved for regional engineering planning may be awarded
15	directly to a lead municipality and administered in accordance with this
16	<mark>chapter.</mark>
17	(c) Funding. In each fiscal year, the Department may use up to 30 percent
18	of the total capital appropriation for construction grants provided under 10
19	V.S.A. chapter 55 to award engineering planning advances.
20	(d) Technical assistance from Regional Planning Commission. Any
21	municipality may contract with a Regional Planning Commission to assist in

1	administration and management of the planning advance, oversight of
