Market Structure

Natural Monopolies (Utilities)

- Type of monopoly with high fixed infrastructure (network) costs that, once established, discourage new entrants
- Private companies "affected with the public interest"
- Regulatory compact utility accepts an obligation to serve in return the government's promise to set rates that will compensate it fully for the costs it incurs to meet that obligation

Market-based Companies

Prices are controlled naturally by the supply of and demand for services

Vermont Utilities

Energy Sector

- ► Electric companies
 - ▶ Distribution utilities (17)
 - ► Investor-owned (GMP)
 - ► Coops (2)
 - ► Municipal departments (14)
 - All, except BED and Stowe, are part of VT Public Power Supply Authority
 - ▶ Transmission utility (VELCO)
 - ► Efficiency utilities
- Natural gas company

Telecom Sector

- ► Landline telephone companies
 - Incumbent local exchange carriers (ILECs)
- Cable TV (no longer rate regulated because market deemed competitive)

Vermont Market-Based Companies

Energy Sector

- Fuel dealers that provide "delivered" fuels such as propane and heating oil
- Merchant generators

Telecom Sector

- Mobile phone companies
- Internet service providers

State Regulators

Utilities

- Public Utility Commission,
 - Quasi-judicial entity (independent of the Administration)
 - ➤ 3 members one full-time and two parttime, with staggered 6-year terms
 - ▶ Hearings; investigations; rulemaking
 - Self-funded with gross receipts tax (See 2018 DPS report)
- Department of Public Service
 - Public advocacy
 - Planning
 - Consumer affairs and public info.
 - Part of the Administration

All Businesses

- Attorney General
 - Consumer Protection Act
 - Complements the enforcement of federal law, in particular:
 - ► The FTC Act (bans unfair methods of competition and unfair or deceptive acts or practices in commerce)
 - ► The Sherman Act (bans monopolistic practices)

What is Regulated?

Utilities

- Retail rates
 - Traditional cost of service
 - Prudent
 - Used and useful
 - Reasonable return
 - Alternative or incentive regulation
- Financial management
- Inter-company practices
- Electric company planning and supply

Utilities and some non-utilities

- Quality and terms of service
- Consumer protection
- Facility siting
 - 248 new transmission facilities; electric generation facilities; and natural gas pipelines (also some purchases and investments)
 - 248a wireless telecom facilities

Market-based companies

- Must comply with the Consumer Protection Act
- Industry-specific energy and telecom laws
 - Propane Rules
 - No telecom "cramming"

Federal Regulators

Energy

FERC (Federal Energy Regulatory Commission

 Regulates the interstate transmission of natural gas, electricity, and oil.

Regional – ISO-New England

- The Regional Transmission Operator (RTO) for New England
 - Manages the grid
 - Administers wholesale electricity market
 - Power system planning

Telecom

FCC (Federal Communications Commission)

- Regulates interstate communication services
- Interconnection and intercarrier compensation

All Businesses

FTC (Federal Trade Commission)

Department of Justice, Antitrust Division

Network Infrastructure

Energy

- Transmission
 - High voltage bulk transmission of electricity
 - Voltages of 115 kV (kilovolt) or higher - VELCO
 - ▶ (open access)
- Substations
 - ▶ Transformers (lower voltage)
- Distributions lines (or directly to large enterprises?)

Telecom (physical layer)

- Transmission
 - ► High capacity transport link
 - ▶ Fiber-optic cable
 - ▶ Backhaul/middle mile
 - State-owned (open access)
- Switching station (central office)
 - Circuit/packet switching
- Loops (last-mile facilities); or directly to enterprise customers
 - Unbundled network elements

Universal Service Policies

Energy

- Rural electrification
- ▶ LIHEAP Fuel assistance
- Company discounts (electric and natural gas)
- VLITE Vermont Low-Income Trust for Electricity

Telecom

- High-Cost Program/Connect America Fund
- Lifeline
- ▶ Relay service
